Gives \$50,000 to San Francisco—is Accepted.  
Washington, D.C., May 11.—Although the president has decided that it is not proper for the United States government to accept contributions from abroad, for the relief of the San Francisco sufferers, Secretary Taft found it possible to do so in his capacity as secretary of the American Red Cross Association, and he has accepted a contribution from the Japanese Red Cross Society of \$50,000 tendered through Viscount Aoki, the Japanese ambassador.

### THE SPEECH

From Czar, At Douma's Opening, Fell Flat.  
IT WAS COLORLESS  
WAS GREETED WITH STONY SILENCE, BY DEPUTIES.

London, May 11.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times, in a cable concerning the Russian inauguration, says that to say that the speech from the throne was a disappointment, is to put it very mildly. His majesty's first public utterance was on the whole colorless, except for the reference to the peasants and education, and the passages, "I for my part will watch over the stability of institutions granted by me," and "The welfare of the state demands not only liberty, but also order based on right."  
The total omission of the word "autocracy," and the inclusion of the word "right," saved the speech from being actually distasteful to the vast majority of the duma, but the stony silence which the deputies greeted the discourse with, in contrast to the prolonged roar of applause from the court and bureaucracy. This was eloquent of the general import of the imperial pronouncement.  
"Yesterday's events," adds the correspondent, "show that the long hoped for reconciliation between the czar and the people is far from being an accomplished fact."

### THE MARATHON VICTOR

In London—Sails For Home Tomorrow.  
London, May 11.—W. J. Sherring, winner of the Marathon race, is in London, and sails for Canada, on the Campania on Saturday. Interviewed, Sherring expressed regret that the English championships were not held at home. Had these been set for decision, say in a fortnight, he would have remained and competed in the four mile race. In sporting circles, Sherring's win is the redeeming feature in the otherwise comparatively poor showing of British entries at Olympia.

### FIND OLD GOLD HOARD.

William T. Miller Tearing Down House, Strikes \$900.  
Buffalo, May 11.—In an ancient foundation case beneath the old Richardson homestead, in the village of Holland, an iron pot containing about \$900 in gold and silver coins, and bearing the mintage stamp of more than a century ago, was discovered by William T. Miller to-day. Miller was engaged in tearing down the old house. It is believed that the coins were placed in the case by Philo Richardson, who died more than fifty years ago.

### Soldiers Get Their Reward.

Washington, D.C., May 11.—It is not often that a troop of cavalry of the regular army is so well treated in return for its gratuitous labors in behalf of charity as has been Troop H, of the 13th Cavalry, on duty at Fort Meyer, Virginia, which took part in a charity fête given at John R. McLean's country house near Washington, in behalf of the San Francisco sufferers. The Washington woman who had obtained the services of the troop was anxious to do something for them. She got the leading caterer of the town to send out an elaborate luncheon of sandwiches, ice cream and cake, with some kegs of beer, added to which she presented the troop with a silver loving cup, inscribed "Bravely, they rode, and well." Nehlin has recently pleased army people more than this act in acknowledgment of the services of the troop.

### "Joe" Letter Expelled.

Chicago, May 11.—Announcement is made that Joseph Letter, who carried on a spectacular "corner" in wheat eight years ago, had been suspended from membership on the Chicago Board of Trade. Letter's suspension is said, was because of complaint from a trader that a bill for \$8,000 was still unpaid. Letter declared he would settle with all creditors as soon as they became "reasonable."  
Will Collect French Trophies.  
Paris, May 11.—General Niox, the director of the French army museum, has been authorized by the government to compile a historical and descriptive catalogue of the flags taken in battle from the enemy by the French army, and if possible, to collect them under one roof. At present these trophies of French military glory are widely dispersed.  
Arrested; Then Wed.  
New York, May 11.—Victor E. Freeman, arrested on a charge of embezzling \$12,000, secured bail and rushed away to be married. His best man, looked up, did not get away.

### IS CRITICALLY ILL.

Aliments Give No Promise of His Recovery.  
Washington, May 11.—Senator Arthur P. Gorman, of Maryland, is critically ill at his home in this city. He has not been in his seat in the senate for many months. Within the last few days he had a severe sinking spell and his life was despaired of. His sickness began several months ago with a back of the grippe with every indication that it would culminate in pneumonia, but this was averted, and now, it is learned, he is suffering from a complication of ailments, which give no promise of his recovery.  
Arthur Pae Gorman was born in Howard county, Maryland, March 11th, 1839. In 1862 he was appointed page in the senate of the United States. In 1880 he was made a senator. Gorman has been often mentioned as a presidential possibility. He has been a democrat all his life.

### ANGERS ARABS.

Gaza, Syria, May 11.—A strip of land along the Syrian-Egyptian frontier from the coast eastwards, having an area of over 100,000 square miles, and which for many years has been regarded as the territory of the Bedouins, has recently been formally added to the domains of the sultan of Turkey, resulting in great irritation among the Arabs.

### JEWS FLEE IN FEAR.

Believe Open Conflict is Inevitable.  
Odessa, May 11.—Although Jewish emigration from South Russia decreased during the last two months, it still averages upwards of 100 daily from Odessa alone, and the exodus from the province generally is proportionately larger in consequence of the general apprehension that the danger to the Jews is greater there than in Odessa, where they constitute only a third of the half million population.  
The Jews are pessimistic regarding the immediate future. They believe an open conflict between parliament and the government is inevitable and that they will be the first to suffer from the upheaval which is bound to result from such a conflict.

### BOYCOTT IS WANING.

American Exports to China Have Increased.  
Pekin, May 11.—The statements to the effect that there is apprehension in the United States that the boycott of American goods is growing have been completely disproved. All the information obtainable shows that the movement is waning.  
The Chinese customs report, for 1905 just issued, shows that the American exports were 7,000,000 taels (about \$60,000,000), compared with 29,000,000 in 1904. Importers made enormous speculative purchases early in the year, chiefly in anticipation of war demands and is increasing in importance would be natural under any circumstances until these stocks are distributed.

### TO BE A CITY

To Take in Suburbs and Bring This About.  
Cornwall, Ont., May 11.—A movement has been started here to make Cornwall a city by incorporating within the city limits the adjacent suburbs of Beaconsfield, Gladstone, Lorneville, the G.T.R. station and vicinity and perhaps Smithville, all of which are now part of the county of Cornwall township. These suburbs hold a large population, between 2,000 and 3,000, and they enjoy nearly all the advantages of the town.

### Church 125 Years Old.

North Orange, N.J., May 11.—The Universalist church, of this city, is 125 years old to-day, and the anniversary is celebrated in an appropriate manner. There will be a meeting this evening, when the Rev. Charles Conklin, of Boston, will deliver a historical address. During the existence of the church there have been nineteen pastors to occupy the pulpit. Ten of the former pastors of the church will be present at the memorial meeting.

### For Robbing Mails.

Quebec, May 11.—For robbing the mails, a letter carrier employed inside the Quebec post office, was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary in the police court. He pleaded guilty in court. He had been in the employ of the government for seven or eight years.

### ONLY ABSOLUTE COMPLIANCE

With British Orders Will Be Tolerated.  
Constantinople, May 11.—The Turkish foreign minister made a visit to Sir Nicholas O'Connor, the British ambassador, to whom he made proposals in regard to settling the Tabakh dispute. Sir Nicholas sternly rejected his proposals, however, and warned the minister that the Turkish troops must be withdrawn from Tabakh, and that the British ultimatum is rapidly expiring, and stated that only absolute compliance with Great Britain's demands will be accepted.

### WIFE MAKES FAOES.

Pastor Wants Divorce Because Wife Ridiculed Him.  
Indianapolis, May 11.—Because his wife, Bertha, made faces at him, in church while he was preaching, and marked her Bible in such a way as to confuse him when he was reading the scriptures, Rev. James E. Hallner, pastor of the Universalist church in Anderson, filed a suit for divorce. Mr. Hallner also alleges that his wife has left him.  
DEATH WINS RACE.  
Overtakes British Navy Officer on United States Soil.  
Port Huron, Mich., May 11.—"Thank God, I'll surely last that long," said Walter J. Green, a lieutenant in the British navy, ill with consumption and hurrying home on a Grand Trunk train from Mexico, as he neared Port Huron. His doctor was sicker than the express, and the lieutenant died on Wednesday morning.

### Fraud Used By Oil Trust.

Chicago, May 11.—Corruption of railroad employees and agents of independent oil companies, dishonest methods of preparing land leases, the giving of short measures and the selling of three kinds of oil out of the same tank, were charged against the Standard Oil company at today's hearing before the interstate commerce commission. The inquiry is held under an order of congress.  
Spanish Captured By Moors.  
Madrid, May 11.—A dispatch received here from Ceuta, the Spanish settlement in the northern part of Morocco, says that several Spanish fishing boats have been captured off the Rif coast by Moors, who treated crews very cruelly. Repressive measures will be resorted to.  
Are Out Of The Race.

### DRAGGED UNDER HARROW.

E. B. Parker Killed Near Magnetawan.  
Magnetawan, May 11.—E. B. Parker, a highly respected farmer and late bailiff of the Fifth division court of this district, was accidentally killed yesterday. Mr. Parker was harrowing a field near his residence, when his team ran away, dragging him along the ground, causing injuries from which he died. His daughter, witnessing the sad affair, rushed to her father's assistance, and succeeded in extricating him. After raising himself up and smiling he fell back and expired almost immediately. Mr. Parker, of the Eric RR., Meadville, Pa., and J. B. Parker, Fort Smith, Ark., sons of the deceased, have been telegraphed for.

### FIND SHORTAGE.

Victim of Tragedy Nearly \$300,000 Short.  
New York, May 11.—Examination of the books and accounts of Charles L. Spier, Jr., confidential man of Henry H. Rogers, of the Standard Oil company, shows that he embezzled \$180,000 to \$200,000 in cash and securities. It is likely, however, that the loss to Mr. Rogers will be reduced to a nominal amount through the recovery of securities, some of which Spier had transferred without warrant to his wife. There is evidence that Spier speculated to a very heavy extent and that he was caught in the sensational slump in the stock market which followed the San Francisco earthquake.

### THE SHEPHERD WAS ROBBED.

Pastor Met a Woman and Missed \$150.  
Detroit, Mich., May 11.—A clergyman from Toronto, landed in Detroit last night, met a woman in the street and a short time afterwards was shy \$150, which she had deftly abstracted from his pockets. He sought the aid of the police, but as he has no idea of where she was robbed, police were unable to help him. The clergyman refused to give his name. He is about thirty-five years old, wears glasses and wore a long gray overcoat, over his clerical garb. He looked sheepish on facing Chief of Detectives McDonnell, and told of his loss with fear and trembling.

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### Finds Ancient Treasures.

Buffalo, May 11.—William T. Miller, a farmer living at South Wales, while tearing down the homestead of the late Philo Richardson, built nearly 150 years ago, found an iron pot containing more than \$900 worth of gold and silver mined in the latter part of the seventeenth century.
