ROCKEFELLER DIVIDENDS.

Reflections on His Standard Oil Takings.

Wall Street Journalists are estimating that John D. Rockefeller has received in dividends from his share of Standard Oil stock about \$14,000,000 since 1898. This is probably the rate of about \$14,000,000 a year, or nearly \$1,000,000 every business day. If Mr. Rockefeller should adopt the rule of giving a tenth of his income to charity, this would mean a disbursement of \$1,400,000 a year, or nearly \$1,000,000 every business day. Mr. Rockefeller is a philanthropist of a high order. He has given more than that, but his Standard Oil dividends are only a part of his income, and his outside investments must be enormous, and large as are his charities, the balance left for the protection of his family and the interests of his children is a large one. Nevertheless, such a fortune be made the object of envy? Shall it be made the object of laws the intention of which is confiscation?
