## THOUSANDS ARE DEAD.

Floods Destroy Greater Part of  
Chinese City.

Tokio, May 26.—The Japanese con-  
sulate at Hsing-Tan, in Human pro-  
vince, China, sends additional details  
of the disastrous floods of the Siang  
river, reported some weeks ago. All  
the valleys along the river were inundated,  
homes swept away by hundreds and  
thousands of men and animals  
drowned. At least 10,000 people per-  
ished in the greater part of the wall-  
city was destroyed. Immense loss  
of life occurred among the Chinese,  
but no Japanese were killed. The  
Human Steamship company steamers  
are still running, but can get no pas-  
sengers or cargo. It is feared the de-  
struction of the rice crop in the flood-  
area may cause an extensive famine.

Hsing-Tan is a city in Human pro-  
vince, South Central China. The  
Siang river flows into Tung Ting  
lake, which is connected by an estuary to  
the Yang-Tse Kiang. The floods  
were first reported from Hankow,  
about 100 miles below Tung Ting.  
Ting.

New Lake in Manitoba.

Medicine Hat, May 26.—Corpl. Bottley,  
of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, says  
the soldiers have succeeded in  
erecting a earthbank around a small  
arid lake in the corner near Eagle  
Lake. He was camped there,  
and was awakened by a violent shock.  
The new lake is twenty miles south of  
Swift Current. At first streams were  
thrown thirty feet into the air.

## Drowned Among Rapids.

Pembroke, Ont., May 26.—Two West-  
most young men, Thomas Dadson,  
school teacher, and John MacEachen,  
telegraph operator, attempted to  
cross the rapids on Thursday. Their  
canoe upset, and both were drowned.  
The bodies have not yet been recov-  
ered.

## SHED TEARS

Ena's Emotions Stirred By  
The Ovations.

## ALFONSO IS RADIANT

AS HE RIDES BESIDE HIS  
AFFIANCED BRIDE.

Ladies Loosed Doves, and Threw  
Flowers on the Princess Lan-  
dau—Thousands Admitted to  
Courtly to Greet Her.

Madrid, May 26.—The arrival of  
King Alfonso and Princess Ena, at  
the Pardo Palace, last evening, was  
the climax of the most remarkable  
scene of enthusiasm and rejoicing ever  
witnessed in Spain. The fourteen  
hours' journey from iron on the front-  
ier was one continuous ovation, and  
indeed once the young princess  
was unable to check her emotion and  
shed tears.

The Queen Mother Christina, accom-  
panied by ministers and other  
functionaries, received Princess Ena at  
El Pardo. After a great greeting had  
been exchanged, flowers were  
then taken in carriages to drive to  
the palace. The princess was  
met by a crowd of ladies, drawn by a  
fine and gaily caparisoned King  
Alfonso, looking radiantly happy,  
rode along side the carriage, and was  
followed by a brilliantly accoutred staff.

During the drive to the palace, ladies,  
in balconies, loosed doves, and threw  
flowers into the landau, containing the  
princess, until it was nearly covered.  
The princess was reached at eight o'clock amid  
the roar of guns. After the royal  
party had entered, several thousand  
persons were admitted to the great  
court yard, where Alfonso and Ena  
and others repeatedly responded from  
a balcony to the greetings.

COAL LANDS IN ALASKA.

Laws of States Applicable to  
That Possession.

Washington, May 26.—The coal lands  
of the United States are made  
applicable to Alaska in every partic-  
ular, a bill which has been  
signed by the Senate favorably to  
the Senate committee on public lands. The pro-  
visions for the entry of coal lands by  
associations have been changed, so  
often that they are not clear. The  
bill now reported authorizes four or  
more associations of coal land holders to  
make entry and develop tracts of  
610 acres, but still prohibits one person  
from locating more than 160 acres.  
The purpose is to aid in the develop-  
ment of those lands. As passed  
by the house, associations are  
authorized to develop an educational course  
on their lands.

GENERAL FRANK LINSTON.

Proved himself the victor in an

FIRE OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All  
Over The World.

Eight inches of snow fell in  
Colorado on May 23rd and 24th.  
Japan has decided to declare for  
equal opportunity for all nations in  
Manchuria.

Chicago has received up to  
and including May 19th, 635 cars of  
relief supplies.

An investigation is to be made of  
the iron ore, zinc deposits, and water  
power of Canada.

The king has decided that the wife  
of the governor-general of Canada, is  
entitled to be styled her excellency.

After thirteen years service, Rev. J.  
S. St. John, Roman Catholic priest, of  
Trinity church, Watertown, N.Y.

An electrical storm killed three per-  
sons and fatally injured another, be-  
sides doing great damage to crops in  
Richmond, Ind.

Francis Kossuth, leader of the uni-  
ted Hungarian opposition, declares that  
the rumors of a ministerial crisis are  
wholly unfounded.

Alexander Berkman, who served four  
years for attempting to assassinate  
Henry C. Frick, married, at Detroit,  
Emma Goldman, anarchist.

Edward Neil, blacksmith, was killed,  
and Joseph Pigott, engineer, badly  
hurt, near Guelph, by an engine  
bumper into one they were fixing.

A crusade to drive the trading  
steamship out of Philadelphia  
has been begun by the Brazil Protective  
Association of that city.

James H. Parr has been arrested in  
Cleveland on the charge of having  
caused the death by poisoning of Ma-  
tilda Kelly, a stenographer of Pitts-  
burgh, Pa.

Dr. John Scott, Toronto, has been  
appointed superintendent of education  
and James W. Walker, principal of  
St. George's Collegiate, has been ap-  
pointed as instructor of high schools.

On the charge of having administered  
poison to his wife, causing death, Dr. Brower, of Tom's River,  
N.J., has been committed to jail. The  
dead woman's organs have been sent to  
Philadelphia for analysis.

It was officially stated that the  
man referred to as Sir was killed  
in the explosion of a bomb May 3rd, has  
been identified as a Polish terrorist  
named Lapidus, who several times  
had been sentenced to terms of im-  
prisonment for nihilism.
