**JOHNNY VOWINKEL**  
 AND HIS RISE IN THE BASE-  
 BALL WORLD.

"Chancer" Elliott Spied Him Out  
 When He Hit Him on the  
 Head With a Ball—He's in  
 Demand Now.

Owego, Pa., June 25.—Elliott, whom  
 Larry Sutton has corralled for the local  
 team, has the distinction of in-  
 troducing Johnny Vowinkel to profes-  
 sional baseball. Elliott is a veter-  
 an at the game, and by the way, it  
 is not only a star catcher, but a hard  
 hitter.

Some five years ago Elliott was the  
 captain of the Kingston, Ont., team  
 in the Northern New York League,  
 and had together a "pretty warm ap-  
 propriation" of ball tossers, they were  
 leaving all comers until one day an  
 independent aggregation from Water-  
 town struck Kingston town. Previous  
 to this Johnny Vowinkel to profes-  
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 is not only a star catcher, but a hard  
 hitter.

Although only a youngster at that  
 time, Johnny had the same fine nerve  
 that carried him later into the front  
 ranks of professional baseball. He  
 didn't have the curves or speed he has  
 today, no doubt, but he could lace  
 them over some. "Chancer" Elliott  
 can swear to that.

But, to make a long story short,  
 Johnny went into the box against the  
 Canucks that day. The first man up  
 was Elliott. The first ball pitched  
 was a high in-shoot. There was a  
 quick break, and before the batter  
 could dodge it had struck him on the  
 head. That ended his playing that  
 day. Johnny won the game hands  
 down, and so impressed was Elliott  
 with the boy's work that there was a  
 telegram waiting for him when he  
 arrived in Watertown, asking him to  
 return to Kingston at \$80 per month  
 for the remainder of the season.

Johnny went and won seventeen  
 straight games. He has since that  
 time in familiar history, and Johnny  
 is in such demand now that at least  
 once a week he throws down an offer  
 from one of the tri-state league teams  
 at \$350 per month.
