

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of are, to the extent of one-quarter sec-HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a hometead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months residence upon nd cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land ntered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with

(8) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, be-fore the Local Agent. Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making applications for patent he settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Do-minion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention

stanted upon payment in advance \$5 per annum for an individual, from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a c A free miner, having discovered mineral place, may, locate a claim 1,500x1,-The fee for recording a claim is \$5.
At least \$100 must be expended on the laim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.
