GRAVITY OF SITUATION RECOGNIZED BY THE PRESS.

Parallels of Early Stages of the French Revolution Now Declared Complete—Orders to Troops Are Countenanced.

Elected president of the lower house of the Russian National Assembly, is the most learned member of that parliamentary body.

Parliament has burned its bridges and virtually has taken the step which the French states general did when it transformed itself into a national conference.

By haunting the fundamental laws and practically declaring that it proposes to exercise full parliamentary rights with a responsible ministry it has become in the eyes of the law a revolutionary body.

The government, if it dares to fight, said M. Koshkine, one of the constitutive members of the house, "can dispense the parliament, but the victory of bureaucracy would be only temporary."
