COURTS 20 YEARS

ENDS LIFE WHEN SWEET-HEART DIED.

Fiance, Unable to Withstand Shock After Long Devotion; Drowns Himself.

London, May 31.—The dead body was found in the River Lea. The logs were tied with a rope which extended up to the waist, and fastened the left hand to the side.

"A love tragedy for you," said Dr. Wynn Westcott to the jury at the inquest at Hackney after the sad life story of James Tullett, aged forty-four had been unfolded.

Tullett lived at 30 Bolckstone road, West Ham. He had been courting for a very long time, said his sister, but his sweetheart died after an illness of only a few hours.

"How old was the lady?" asked the coroner. "Forty-two," replied the witness. "He hardly spoke from the time she died."

"How long had he been engaged?" "From childhood. My mother and her mother were left widows, and the two children went to school together and grew up together. They became engaged, but never married. They had been keeping company for over twenty years."

The witness added that Tullett had said that he could not bear to attend the funeral of his sweetheart.

He had drowned himself, and the manner in which he had bound himself with a rope was accounted for by the fact that he was a good swimmer. Suicide during temporary insanity, brought about by the death of his sweetheart, was the verdict returned.

SCHOOL MATTERS.

There Was Not a Big Influx During May.

The month of May, this year, experienced less activity, in admissions of new pupils in the public schools, than a year ago. This year thirty-one new pupils were admitted, while last year 101 entered. This, however, was probably made up for in the fact that April was the "big month" this year and the small one last year.

All the schools are overcrowded in the junior and kindergarten classes, especially at the primary school. In the senior classes, there is more room as, one by one, those not intending to take the examinations are dropping out to go to work until school resumes in the fall. All the classes are busy in preparation for the examinations, which will commence in about three weeks. As the senior pupils move forward, after passing in their studies, and the junior scholars advance in the places made vacant, room will be made for the admittance of the new first year boys and girls in the fall.

A Williamsburgh teacher reported to the authorities, yesterday, that children under the regulation age were working in local factories. This is a matter that should be investigated. As there is no regular trunk office now it is up to the police force to see into the matter and stringently enforce the law.

GANANOQUE GLEANINGS.

The Water and Sewage Connections Rushed.

Gananoque, May 30.—Work on the water and sewage connections is being pushed along rapidly on King street. The people are getting anxious for fear the streets may be torn up on July 1st. But at the rate connections are being made lately, they will be well in hand before that time.

A large number of English emigrants came to town on Monday morning, and were located by Robert Crothers, of the government emigration department.

On Thursday, July 26th, a monster regatta will be held at the island and already several clubs in the district have expressed a desire to be on hand.
