**Surprise Of The Hour.**

A peculiar development in life insurance—and one of the most remarkable in this age of surprises—is the sale of the Mutual Life's English business, and amounting to about \$75,000,000 of insurance, without the consent and knowledge of the company.

The English manager was an American, and a former manager in New York state. He received a job when the company notified him that, pursuant to the provisions of the new New York law, there would have to be a big decrease in the expense account. Certain outlays formerly permitted would have to cease. There would have to be an end of all seeming extravagance.

The company's representative made some sort of protest. He had his views, and it is presumed that he took his own method of expressing them. But as they did not prevail he negotiated for the sale of the English business of the Mutual Life to the North British. The deal hinged on two considerations, (1) that the risks would not be medically re-examined, and (2) that the transfer of business involved only the payment by the Mutual Life to the North British of the surrender value of the certificates.

The Mutual Life is alleged to have known only of the transaction when it was complete, and it then sent the vice-president to England to see what he could do about it. The case strikes the casual reader as most extraordinary and inexplicable. The English manager must have possessed unusual power, and he made an unusual use of it. Whatever the facts the results are the same—that the Mutual Life has sustained a slump in business that is staggering in its effects. Life insurance is good, but its virtue is its stability, and really the experience of the past few months and the revelations of the present are enough to damage the thing beyond redemption.

**Check On Abuse.**

The calling of a newspaper man to the bar of the Commons, to account or atone for the intemperate manner in which he spoke of Mr. Foster, may do some good. The explanation of the journalist in question cannot be anticipated, but he could plead that he was no worse than others, that he has simply breathed the air of parliament, the air of members as well as pressmen, and he wrote a slashing criticism according to the custom of the times.

The premier said that a member of the house had the right of calling a critic to account, but was it wise? He had been lampooned and slandered, but he held his peace. Mr. Fielding said that there was "nothing more rascally in journalism," than what had appeared in the English papers of Ontario. The member who was referred to recently as a "hoolligan," wanted the indictment enlarged so as to include his assailant. A senator had accused the premier of depriving his Catholic friends of their rights by the "murderous" legislation of last session. Incidentally the Orange order came in for notice, and for a time the house was again moved by the racial cry.

Mr. Foster regressed his motion. He wanted the man who pictured him as the incarnation of evil brought face to face with him in the presence of the august assembly. The effect may be to put a brake on the reporter's reckless pen. Will it put a bridle on the members' tongues? Will Mr. Foster himself become more civil in his speech? There is room for improvement, keeping in mind the hateful speech he made about the ex-minister of the interior, when that gentleman was absent from the house and country.

**TO DEVELOP SYSTEM.**

The Army to Have Its Own Wireless.

Washington, D.C., June 8.—It has been decided that the army signal corps is to develop its own wireless telegraph system. There is an increasing call for this method of communication at the coast artillery forts, and it is found that the installation of such a complete system as that in the Southern New York district would represent a great cost, for which the signal corps, charged with the work of equipment, does not possess the funds. The experts of the corps in Washington have decided to experiment with a new system, buying the material in the open market and assembling the parts, to the end that they may have a means of wireless communication which shall answer the purpose of the coast artillery where it is used in sending messages between the target boats and the shore during the firing of the heavy guns. The system is found to be of great value in that respect, and the signal corps people believe they can get up a system which will be as efficient as the best of the commercial systems, which cost so much money. If the corps electricians are successful, this will mean a substantial loss of prospective business to the wireless telegraph companies, which realized that wireless was to be extensively used along the coast in artillery communication.
