FIGHTING REBELS.

The Rebels Had Many Men Killed.

Durban, June 11.—Natalian forces, under Col. Mackenzie and Barker, have had a severe fight with rebels in the Momo Valley. The rebels were defeated 350 of them being killed, including the important Chief Makhazulu. The Natalians lost Capt. Macfarlane, of the Transvaal Rifles, and Lieut. Marsden killed and several troops wounded. It is reported that Chief Bamba was wounded in the fight. The rebels fled, demoralized.

SEDDON DIES

Suddenly Of Heart Failure On Steamer.

HIS LAST SPEECH MADE AT SYDNEY ON SATURDAY.

When He Declared That Australia's Trade Should Go to Britain—Suicidal Policy for Colonies to Send Trade to Foreign Countries.

Sydney, N.S.W., June 11.—Richard John Seddon, prime minister of New Zealand, died, suddenly, of heart failure, last evening, aboard the steamer Owestry Grange, on which he had embarked, yesterday morning, to return to New Zealand. The Owestry Grange put back into Sydney. Mr. Seddon was sixty-one years of age. His death was totally unexpected. Seddon, who Mr. Seddon had been in Australia since the middle of May. He came here to consult Alfred Deakin, the prime minister of Australia, on important questions, mainly those concerning the New Zealand. He visited the principal towns, making vigorous speeches and receiving deputations on various matters interesting to Australia, such as colonial preferences and alien immigration.

He made a speech on Saturday, at Sydney, declaring it was a suicidal policy for the colonies to send trade to foreign countries, thus enabling them to strengthen their navies. Trade, he said, should go to the motherland to assist in strengthening the British navy. When Mr. Seddon sailed, yesterday morning, he appeared to be in his customary health.

THE SCHEME PROPOSED.

Rev. George Jackson Will Be Assistant.

Toronto, June 11.—When the first draft of the stationing committee of the Toronto Methodist conference is announced this week it will be seen that Rev. George M. Brown, Davisville church, Sherbourne street Methodist church, to which he has been invited, Rev. Mr. Brown will be superintendent of the church, his assistant being Rev. George Jackson, B.D., the distinguished divine from Edinburgh, Scotland, who will occupy the pulpit for three years. As Dr. Jackson did not wish to sever his connection with the church, he could not join the Toronto conference, as no minister is allowed to belong to two conferences at the same time. It was therefore necessary that he come to the Sherbourne street church as assistant or supply. Rev. Mr. Brown's duties will be chiefly pastoral.

TO REGULATE COURTING.

Wants to Make Love Run Real Smooth.

New Orleans, June 11.—Representative Smith, of Rapides, has introduced in the state legislature a bill, applying only to whites, which provides: It shall be unlawful for any young man to attempt to court any young woman before he is twenty-four years of age. Before making such attempt he shall inform the parents or guardians of the woman he proposes to court of his intention to do so. He shall make affidavit before a justice of the peace that his courtship is in good faith.

A Thousand A Day.

Quebec, June 11.—Since the opening of navigation, 26,000 trans-Atlantic passengers arrived at Quebec, being an average of 1,000 per day up to and including Saturday, 9th instant. The majority of the immigrants are bound for the North-West.

Smith's Falls Man Killed.

Stratford, Ont., June 11.—Robert Burkett, a miner, whose home was at Smith's Falls, Ont., was killed in a cave-in here.

CANADA'S REVENUE.

The Returns Are Far Ahead of Other Years.

Ottawa, June 11.—The revenue of the Dominion of Canada during the eleven months of the current financial year, up to the first of June, amounted to \$17,012,315, an increase of \$7,657,588 over the corresponding period of last year. The ordinary expenditure was \$50,206,425, an increase of \$3,349,193, and the expenditure on capital account, \$11,781,138, an increase of \$1,611,229.

The returns show that, during the eleven months, the customs collected increased \$4,289,000 over 1905, the excise collections, \$1,285,000, the post office receipts, \$6,986,000, and the receipts from public works and railways \$679,000.

The monthly payment of \$1,936,286 represents an increase of \$395,845.

The railway subsidy payments of \$1,637,574 were \$123,278 larger than the corresponding period of the year before.

A MIGHTY STORM.

Two Killed at Springfield as Result of Wind.

St. Thomas, June 9.—Yesterday thirty-five men were at work building a new barn, four miles north-east of Springfield, owned by James McClinton, when the terrific windstorm struck them.

A number of men were in the act of raising a large beam, when the wind struck the building, which collapsed, crushing down on the men. Two named William Clapton, aged thirty-five years, and M. Wilson, a lad of seven years of age, who were working in the basement, were killed instantly.

Wilson, father of the young lad killed, is also seriously injured and his hand crippled. Several others were also seriously injured.

SLAIN AT THE DOOR.

Mysterious and Cruel Murder in New York.

New York, June 11.—The identity of the murderer of Mrs. Alice Kinnear, who was struck down on the step of her room in the Borough of Bronx, last night, is still a mystery to the police.

The motive which prompted the murder was not ascertained, but the police were at work upon a theory that it might have been jealousy.

At twelve o'clock last night she was called to the door by an unknown person who struck her a blow on the head.

The murderer then disappeared, but left a piece of gaspie, with which the murder was done.

SEEKING INFORMATION.

As to Inspection of Meats in Packing-Houses.

London, June 11.—John Burns, member of the local government board, has requested the foreign office to communicate with the state department at Washington, to what extent reliance can be placed on meat inspection industry in this country, which he had taken this action he stated, in the house, that he had ascertained that a quantity of boneless beef is imported into this country from America, and converted into sausages which are sold as English products. The local government board, he added, had taken steps to see that the authorities exercised their powers in the inspection of these goods.

WILL DRESS 5,000 WOMEN.

Millionaire Bachelor Takes This Way to Pay Debt.

San Francisco, June 11.—Raphael Well, a local millionaire merchant, has decided to pay at one stroke part of the debt he owes womankind for remaining a bachelor. To fifty charitable women he has given the task of selecting 5,000 neckties which will entitle them to an outfit of dresses, cloaks, shoes and lingerie. He says it is a good time for other San Francisco bachelors to square up and balance their books.

Sir Hector Very Ill.

Quebec, June 11.—Sir Hector Langevin is recovering from a very severe attack of bronchitis pneumonia, since last Thursday. The sickness took a change for the worse on Saturday evening and on the advice of his physician, Rev. Mr. Lalanne was sent to hospital. Sir Hector was reported no better; this case is serious. Sir Hector is nearly eighty years old.

A Perth Presentation.

Perth, Ont., June 11.—J. A. Allen, barrister, who leaves Tuesday for Regina to open a law office, was presented with an address and cabinet of silver by the citizens of Perth. Judge Scoble acted as chairman, and the address was read by Mayor Fox. The signatures to the address represented many members of the law profession.

Only A Small Deficit.

Amherst, Ont., June 11.—The shortage of town Treasurer Leggett has been found to be \$650. The amount will be made good by Mr. Leggett and his friends. The treasurer claims the deficit was due to the loss of his office in the cause of the trouble.

Entered An Appeal.

Quebec, June 11.—Senator Choquette has entered an appeal, on Saturday, last, from the judgment against him some time ago in the case of Parent vs. Choquette.

During the electric storm of Wednesday night the dwelling house of John McCaw, Milford, was struck by lightning and consumed.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

Eight deaths resulted from the recent storm in this province.

Goremykin, the Russian premier, has not been asked for his resignation.

France and Peru Mucari were smothered to death in a landslide near Kamnitskaya.

Emperor Francis Joseph regards the reversion of peace as a guarantee of the triple alliance as a whole.

It is said \$30,000 will be taken in at the benefit to Ellen Terry in London, Eng., on Tuesday.

Dr. C. W. McRidley, Smith's Falls, was elected president of the Eastern Ontario Dentists' Association.

At Tokio, an imperial ordinance was gazetted authorizing the formation of a South Manchurian railway company.

Twenty thousand Christian Scientists have assembled in Boston to witness the dedication of the new temple.

The Elder-Dumpester liner, Etolia, with lumber from St. John, N.B., for Barry, England, is ashore on Cape Sable.

Dr. Robert S. Ives, a prominent physician of New Haven, Conn., died Saturday from appendicitis, aged sixty-three years.

At Edmonton, George McLean was found guilty of abetting the suicide of Mary Fortier, and was sentenced to three years.

A memorial statue to the Marquis of Dufferin was unveiled at Belfast. The figures on either side of the pedestal represent India and Canada.

At Huntington, W. Va., the plant of the West Virginia Brewing company was burned. The loss is \$300,000, partly covered by insurance.

At New York, one man was killed and two more badly hurt in a wreck on the Buffalo, Rochester & Pittsburgh railway, on Saturday morning.

The Queen of Spain has sent a message to the governor-general, expressing the heartfelt thanks of the king and herself for Canada's kind sympathy and congratulations.

The new postmaster-general has revoked the order of his predecessor, Hon. A. R. Aylesworth, prohibiting the sale of the socialist journal, Appeal to Reason.

Ex-Commodore Aemilius Jarvis, of the Royal Canadian Yacht club, has sold his famous cutter Merrythought, to a syndicate of R.C.Y.C. members, headed by E. G. Stantton.

M. Ichida, formerly Japanese minister to China, has relieved M. Hayashi preparatory to the latter taking up the duties of minister of Japan at Paris.

The St. John's, Nfld., government has commissioned the whaler Neptune as an additional fishery cruiser to enforce the foreign fishing vessel act along the west coast of Belle Isle Strait.

As a result of fifty lumber pillars going out on strike for an increase of twenty-five cents a day, 1,000 men in the employ of four of the largest mills in St. John, N.B., are thrown out of work.

At Winnipeg, the building returns up to Friday show 1,519 permits issued, making a total of 85,609,700 in building. At the same time last year the amount was 1,201 permits, with a total of \$5,115,200.

While attempting to cross St. John river, N.B., Donald Pizzard was carried over the dam and drowned. The fish-boat was high and the current very strong. Blizzard, only forty-two years of age, leaves a wife and large family.

Finland E. Borer, one of the promoters of the Uvero Plantation company, Boston, who has been on trial on 128 counts of larceny and conspiracy, was found guilty on one count of conspiracy and seventy-three counts of larceny.

George Rowlett, St. John, N.B., eighty-four years of age, a retired carpenter, has been used for breach of promise by Ethel Grace Gibson, a young lady about twenty-five years of age, a native of Newwater. The damages are set at \$10,000.

Arthur Smith, of Beachville, arrested at Woodstock, on the charge of obtaining money under false pretences, on an information preferred by E. G. Hull & Sons, nurserymen, came up before Magistrate Comfort, St. Catharines, and was discharged.

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THE HOTEL MOVEMENT.

Committees are at work to-day vicariously to secure subscription to the hotel project. It is an outrage on Kingston's credit, that they have to screw money out of citizens for so needful a public institution.

The absence of a large first class hotel is the dearest distance Kingston has ever suffered. Men rate a town more for its accommodation for visitors than for its beauties, the educational or charitable institutions, its business or its churches. "Feed the brute" is a wise maxim. Then give him a "good and clean room."

Every one who now comes here and cannot find accommodation goes off and tells a score of others and the name of Kingston will be Dennis in far off states and countries. It will be avoided as a plague spot. The casual visitors are few now; they will be fewer still unless we shake off the disability.

One public-spirited person only has come forward, from without the Board of Trade, to subscribe. He offered \$200 and was willing to give more if needed. An hundred people more interested in Kingston than he is should give \$100, \$200 to \$300 each, but will have to be begged to do it, and the publicity will have to be pathetic. If public spirit was not sluggish this would not be the case.

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
