COMMERCIAL MATTERS

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

Grand Trunk Railway earnings from June 1st to June 7th, 1906, \$7,472,000; 1905, \$6,284,000; increase, \$1,188,000. J. D. McArthur, Winnipeg, has formed a new \$1,000,000 company, to engage in the railway contracting business. A Bostonian has sold 100 shares of C.P.R. stock at 100 on the Wall street exchange totalled \$10,000. The weekly earnings for the week ended June 7th, \$1,237,000; for the same week last year, \$972,000, increase \$265,000.

An amalgamation of the Great Northern Railway, the Quebec, New Brunswick & Nova Scotia railway and the Chateaugay & Northern railway was completed at a meeting held in Toronto.

The Dominion Iron and Steel company's register indicates that some 22,000 shares are held in Boston, while the register of the Dominion Coal company indicates that the Boston holdings amount to about one-third of the actual number of shares.

The statement of the Ontario Bank for the year ended May 31st, shows net profits of \$1,500,000. The net profit was increased by \$50,000, making that amount \$700,000. In addition to 10 per cent. dividends to shareholders for the year, which total \$97,500, there was transferred to Officers' Pension Fund \$5,000. The balance at credit of Profit and Loss account is \$66,861, as against \$12,235,360 a year ago. Total deposits are \$12,235,360 and the total assets \$16,736,091, of which \$13,504,227 are in loans and investments, which are immediately available.

A SHARP DEBATE

FIRST VOTE IN ASSEMBLY SNOWS OPPOSITION UNDER.

Discussion is Not Ended—More Amendments in Sight—Principal Patrick's Resolution is Sure to Carry.

London, Ont., June 2.—When a first vote on the church union question was reached in the general assembly this afternoon it was seen that the opposition to the measure consisted very largely of talk. The issue was with reference to Mr. McGee's amendment and the assembly helplessly moved it under by 179 against twenty-two for. The question, however, is not yet settled, though the greater portion of the day was devoted to its discussion, and the debate is to be continued to-morrow morning.

Notice has been given of another amendment, and there may be others in abundance. In spite of this, however, the general feeling seems to be that the assembly cannot in honor refuse the negotiations at this stage, and there is little doubt but that Principal Patrick's resolution will carry by an overwhelming majority.

SYNOD OF ONTARIO.

Elections to Provincial Synod and Mission Board.

Before the synod adjourned at twelve o'clock for the elections to the provincial synod and the mission board, R. J. Carson, treasurer, presented his annual report giving a review of the finances of the diocese. The consolidated fund is \$309,088, an increase of \$6,351. The revenue on this was \$19,992. The Episcopal fund is \$62,241, plus rest of \$1,008. The balance at the end of the year were:

Debits—Assessment fund, \$597.36; widows' and orphans' fund, \$2,700.63; St. John's fund, \$2,716.31; Episcopal fund, \$1,956.55.

Credits—Clergy superannuation fund, \$278.49; divinity students' fund, \$674.85; mission fund, \$2,214.98; rectory land fund, \$227.48.
