14TH P.W.O.R. RIFLES INSPECTED ON THE CRICKET FIELD LAST EVENING. Mounted Artillery Kept Crowd Back—Regiment Fully Sustained Its Reputation—Red Cross Men a Credit to the Corps. The 14th Regiment, Prince of Wales' Own Rifles, was inspected, on Thursday evening, at the cricket field, by Col. Gordon, D.O.C. There is no attraction like the soldier boys to bring out the crowd, and last evening was no exception. The scene was one of special brilliancy. The lamps, about the parade grounds, illuminated the scene, and the spectators were kept from crowding upon the field, and interfering with the movements of the battalion, by a squad of mounted artillerymen. The inspecting officer and his staff occupied a position about midway between Union and Barrie streets, and close to Park avenue, and from this point, as a saluting base, watched the movements of the troops. The old stereotyped phrase, that the regiment "fully sustained its reputation," is more than trop of the inspection, and seldom, if ever, did the volunteers go through the greater marching and evolutions with more regularity, and there being ample room for all battalion movements, the men were able to do themselves justice and meet much credit upon Col. Kent and the officers in his command, for the work they have accomplished in bringing the corps up to its present high state of efficiency.
