**Robbed Of His Good Name.**

The electors of South Perth are not inclined to accept the spoils system without resistance. The dismissal of the local registrar was accompanied by proceedings of the most objectionable character. It was charged against him that he abused his trust, that he violated the registry office, and the government went through the farce of holding an enquiry. A commissioner, chosen by the government, because he was favorable to it, took evidence, and made a report. Mr. Whitney gave out that the registrar was guilty of the charges preferred against him, and dismissed him.

The defence is that the registrar is an innocent man, and a public meeting, in passing on the case, reports: "If the commissioner, as stated by Mr. Whitney, reported the charges as proved, we submit that he had little regard for the evidence, and his action only strengthens the opinion that the dismissal of Mr. Whelihan was in fulfilment of threats made by prominent conservatives in the evening of the election, and hoisted on in certain of the press of the riding."

The offence which Mr. Whelihan is alleged to have committed is not that he acted in a partisan way, that he forgot his public place and duty, and became politically obnoxious. If he were an active politician though an office-holder the treatment he has received would not be surprising. But he is declared to be a model official, and his removal was based on a statement which seriously reflects upon his integrity. His redress, therefore, does not lie in an appeal to the federal government to retaliate, and commit an outrage on the plea that one wrong invites another.

The registrar is said to have been grossly slandered, first by the men who fibbed about him, and then the men who pronounced this fibbing truth. If the testimony of credible witnesses at the hearing was deliberately set aside and a decision given which impeached a man's honesty he surely has a remedy in law and should resort to it.

**The Fall Of Langevin.**

The American papers are moralizing upon the life and labours of the late Sir Hector Langevin. It is said of him by one paper that "posterity will probably award to him a higher place in the history of Canada than some of his isolated acts would warrant."

It is added, by way of extenuating his faults, that he "belonged to a generation that regarded the rake-off available to men in important governmental positions as a laudable heritage that should not interfere with the furtherance of the general welfare of the country or exceed a moderate percentage of the people's money."

That is an American view of the situation, and it suggests that perhaps a faulty Canadian—one who was punished for his political offences, and whose atonement was probably complete—has not been fairly judged. Sir Hector Langevin had no use for any one who was not of his political faith, and 1863 not customary to kindly contemplate a fallen foe. But it is the feeling in Canada that Sir Hector was not personally the corrupt one he appeared to be.

He belonged to a party that was hard pressed in its elections, that had these stern and expensive campaigns in close succession, and that, in its extremity was forced to accept combinations. True, in the McGreevy scandal some things were brought home to Sir Hector Langevin, but viewed now, and when the heat of battle has passed away, it is felt that he suffered most and principally because of his associations.

There was another drawback. Sir Hector's party had been a long time in office. It had its army of followers, or retainers, and they were not overly scrupulous about what they did. The scenes which preceded the fall of the minister of public works will never be forgotten. He resisted attack as well as he could, and he eventually capitulated when surrender could not be avoided. He never recovered from this disaster. Perhaps some people forgive him. Parliament tolerated his presence as a member, as when Angers retired he again became a minister. He never regained his power and the confidence of the people.

It may be no excuse that a political leader is pulled down because of those who are about him and tempt him to do evil. The leaders are not regarded as the responsible ones. The strong men are expected to preserve their integrity inviolate, to temporize with no one, to abate no jot or tittle of their independence. Continuity in office makes this a difficult and almost impossible thing. The last man

The Hanesheef left Kingston at 4:25 a.m., with passengers and freight, made stops at Ganoune, Brockville, Prescott, Matilda, Morrisburg, Cornwall, and Colton du Lac, and reached Montreal at 5:35 p.m., or in thirteen hours and ten minutes. That was well considered a fast trip for the Whig editor of fifty years ago. The present Hanesheef takes between twelve and twelve and a half hours to cover the distance, and make perhaps three or four more stops.

**MERELY AS EXPERT.**

**Relation of Mr. Campbell to the Light Plant.**

The resignation of Mr. Campbell, as manager of the light plant, will either be dealt with by the city council at its meeting this evening, or referred to the light committee for recommendation. **NEW AND EVIL ERA**

IN ADMINISTRATION OF ONTARIO AFFAIRS.

The Spoils System in Its Most Offensive Form—The Dismissal of Registrar Brown of East Northumberland—A Near Relation of Dr. Willoughby Appointed.

Colborne Enterprise.

The dismissal of Lieut.-Col. Brown from the registrarship of this riding, for autocratic ear-like methods, for deliberate disregard of fairness and propriety and for utter contempt of public opinion is unique in Canadian history. It is a new and evil era in the administration of our affairs.

Col. Brown's removal has been threatened for many months, but as the office was most efficiently managed and he had become a very popular officer in the absence of any reasonable ground for dismissing, the public had come to think the matter would likely rest. This belief was fortified by the premier's distinct statement, from his place in the house, that except in the case of holders of minor offices no official would be dismissed without a fair investigation affording an opportunity for defence. It will be remembered that this was in reply to an attempt by Dr. Willoughby and some others to introduce the spoils system in its most offensive form and when the premier practically told him if he didn't like it, his resignation would be accepted. In addition to this it was understood on very good ground that Mr. Willoughby would not be dismissed without a fair investigation, and that Col. Brown would not be dismissed without a formal investigation, affording a chance for defence not denied in trivial cases. But Dr. Willoughby wanted the office and he wanted it very badly and as it now appears, for a very near relative. These considerations were so dominant and so dominating that they controlled him, and Mr. Willoughby despite the declaration and pledges given. It remains to be seen whether or not self-respecting citizens will condone such a violation of pledges and disregard of promises.

If Dr. Willoughby's groom is charged with the infraction of a municipal by-law he, in the spirit of British justice, demands a fair trial and to make defence. But in the case of a very responsible office the same Dr. Willoughby procures a dismissal brutal in its character and unfair as it is. The correspondence justifies this view. Last November the charge was partisanship but the case alleged seemed too transparent. This it is understood developed into a charge of criticism that the gentle doctor did not like and did not want repeated.

Then lately charges of an extraordinary character were preferred. The one going back over eight years ago affords evidence of the desperate straits to which they were reduced. Those at all conversant with the facts would be glad to see the explicit denial is abundantly supported by the facts.

As to the second charge in the absence of a most conclusive testimony—there is not a single fact of evidence—everyone without hesitation will accept the colonel's denial. The lack of refinement and disingenuousness of carrying their case grow out of the business operation of a man whose lips are sealed in death will not pass unnoticed.

As to the third charge the colonel's simple denial will be readily accepted unless further evidence is adduced. On June 1st a charge is made presumably by Arthur Gordon Willoughby that a year or so before a request was made by Col. Brown, which the colonel denies having made. Within a week after this the colonel is dismissed and Arthur Gordon Willoughby is appointed his successor as the result of Arthur Gordon's unsupported statement. An epitome of the case seems to be on the one side three shallow and peculiar charges that seem incredible and preposterous; on the other side straight, explicit statements denying every allegation specifically in the whole and in part.

Had Mr. Cinq-Mars been a tory and had the member criticized been a liberal, would the proceedings of the house been the same?


The only complaint the conservatives have to make of the Nova Scotia government is that it has been too long in power. If not corrupt and inefficient why should it be replaced?



**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**

Any even numbered section lands in Manitoba or west Province, excepting reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the head of a family, or any male over 21 years of age, to the extent of 160 acres more or less. Entry must be made upon local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

**HOMESTEAD DUTIES**

As soon as granted an entry, the homesteader is required to perform the following plans:

- (1) At least six months and cultivation of the land under the terms of three years.
- (2) If the father (or father is deceased) of any child is unable to make a homestead, the provisions of the act apply to a farm in the vicinity of the homestead, and the requirements of the act, including the requirements of this act, may be satisfied by residence upon farming land in the vicinity of his homestead, and the requirements of this act may be satisfied by residence upon farming land in the vicinity of his homestead.

**APPLICATION FOR PATENT**

At the end of the term of residence required to perfect the homestead, the homesteader must give notice in writing to the Commissioner of the Land Office at Ottawa, Ontario, of his intention to apply for a patent.
