MANITOBA CROPS.

Big Increase in Wheat and Oats Acreage.

Winnipeg, June 19.—The provincial crop report shows the wheat acreage exceeds last year's record by one-half million, this year's total being over three million acres.

The oats acreage has increased enormously as compared with 1905, the total acreage for this year being 1,154,212. The barley acreage is now 1,142,212, and the grand total of the increase of small grain acreage in Manitoba in 1906 is 655,856. The crop prospects generally are excellent.
