SAVED THE SHIP SCHOONER DUNN'S THRILLING EXPERIENCE.

Disasted, With Sails Blown to Ribbons, But Toronto Captain Was Game and Brought Vessel Safely in. Toronto Telegram.

When a steamboat man, with nothing wrong with his engine and nothing to fear regarding motive power, brings his passengers through a storm safely, they get up a testimonial for him; when a sailing man, crippled in spar and sail, with nothing left intact but the hull beneath his feet, brings his vessel safely home—nothing is said about it.

The Dunn was caught in the same furious cyclone squall that gave the Chicago's passengers such an exciting experience of Niagara. Capt. W. R. Wakely, of 133 Spruce street, Toronto, who sails her, was not taken unprepared. The sails were off the vessel, the big mainsail was lowered and stowed, and all hands were forward taking in the foresail when the squall came.

As though with a special malevolence the wrecked mizzen made a complete wreck of the mainsail, breaking both boom and gaff and tearing the sail.

This cleaned the Dunn completely out of her principal driving power—foresail, mainsail and mizzen, the ribs, top-sail and kites that were left being blown about in the air. The crew, wrecked three lower, but undaunted, Capt. Wakely got his crew to work, "fished" the broken gaff, herring-boned the remnants of the mainsail together, and hoisted the sail, lashed footed, with a tackle on the clew carried to the stump of the shattered mizzen mast. This, with the square top-sail and three jibs, gave her enough way to creep along.

RAILWAY SUBSIDIES. To Be Voted By the Government This Session. Ottawa, June 23.—The minister of railways has given notice of the railway subsidies to be voted this session.

The Ontario subsidies are: The Manitoulin & North Shore railway, 200 miles, \$200,000; Little Current to Sudbury, sixty-four miles, \$200,000; Ontario Central & Hudson's Bay railway, from Sault Ste. Marie, to C.P.R. and branch line, 200 miles, \$600,000; Nepean railway, eighty miles, \$250,000; Sharnot Lake to Bathurst Station, forty-one miles, \$131,000; Owen Sound to Meaford, thirty miles, \$90,000; Kingston to Ottawa, 161 miles, \$515,200; Lake Superior, Long Lake & Albany, ten miles, \$32,000; Bay of Quinte railway, twenty miles, \$60,000.

A RUSSIAN SPY. Watched in Library for Those Who Read Books on Anarchy. New York, June 23.—The arrest of a man, charged with stealing books from the Astor library, yesterday, developed the fact that the Russian government has for several months had an agent in the library to watch the movements of persons who read or make notes from books on the subject of anarchy.

By the Captains and Officers of the White Squadron—The Sights Were New and a Revelation to Many. Ottawa, June 23.—On the steamer St. Lawrence, yesterday, Howard Folger, at dinner, entertained Mayor and Mrs. Ellis, Alda, Boudreau, Desjardins, Gaudier and their wives, several other city fathers, Collector Seguin and the local committee in charge of the big Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen's excursion from here.

"Mr. Folger and the officials used us all well," said Mayor Ellis and Mr. Wilson, second vice-president of the Brotherhood. Near Brockville something went wrong with the America's machinery and with so many on board and a very strong head wind, the crew were slightly anxious, but they handled, used presence of mind and hardly any one on board were any the wiser that the vessel had stopped. She drifted back about two miles and the crew were looking after the anchor chains, when the engineer got the break repaired.

This trip has done a great deal to advertise the St. Lawrence route and Ottawians were immensely pleased at the beauties to nine-tenths new, and so a revelation.
