### NEW YORK LETTER

#### A TINY BIT OF LAND IS VERY VALUABLE.

#### Does Not Pay to Charge Steamship Companies High Rentals — Rockefeller Goes Right Ahead in Spite of Critics.

New York, June 22.—A foot of land in these latter days means a great deal. Land which the Dutch burghers, who considered themselves pretty good on a bargain, would have sold with eagerness at five dollars an acre, is today selling for the price and more per inch. Here is a lease which calls for the payment of \$25.51 per square foot rent, for a space which covers only 1,568 square feet on two floors. This valuable piece is located in the lower building they are going to erect on the corner of Broadway and Wall street, and run up to the height of eighteen stories, or 235 feet. The Board of Health has approved the plan, and opened right into the offices. It may be that enough business can be done in an office with such a limited area, but it seems doubtful. If it can be done anywhere in New York, it is on the spot on which that building will be reared, as the corner of Wall street and Broadway is about the busiest place on the continent. The United States Cigar Store company will occupy this diminutive office. This company is leasing all the desirable corners it can find, and already has even four hundred stores in the city. That rent, and the cigars sold there will have to be almost as costly as Mr. Morgan's, who is reputed to pay four dollars a piece for his strong cigars. How, however, he does not buy them in stores on Broadway, but imports them direct from Cuba.

There can be no doubt that Rockefeller is gaining on the critics of his career, as he goes right ahead in new lines, whereby he reaches the public. The new policy of the Standard Oil company, the policy of publicity, has taken well with the public, and has at least worked this in favor of the monopoly, that the people are now led to expect an answer, no matter whether it answers the attack or not. It gives out at least the fact that the company wishes to come before the public, and makes the assailants more careful with their statements.

Mr. Rockefeller made a big hit with his ocean voyage, appearing as a human being with his fellows, and he was universally pronounced a good one by those who came into contact with him. And now he has captured another idea which cannot fail to capture the public. Formerly he seemed to have no friends, but now those he is pursuing with unrelenting vigor, and deadly purpose have none. None of us liked snakes before, but now, that Rockefeller, like St. Patrick of old, starts out to exterminate them, we are all with him. Miss Lisa Tarbell, by the way, notwithstanding Mr. Rockefeller pays twenty-five cents a head for any snake killed on his grounds, and he is much more than St. Patrick paid for them. Small boys are making their fortunes, and all kinds of men, laborers, mechanics, and all, are adding to their money heard a snake which will come handy in case of need. Meanwhile the woods on Butterfield Hill are safer for travelers, for there are fewer rattlesnakes, copperheads and other poisonous snakes around. Rockefeller expects to be rid of the reptiles before fall, and have his estate as clear of them as his brother William's is.

Here was a town council without corruption—at least we would smile at such irregularities as disturb the Glasgow; a council which knows no party politics and elected a conservative to succeed a liberal as lord provost without a change in its political complexion. Here, too, was a city which knows no boss but itself; which takes the merit system as a matter of course, and without any law enforcing it; a city which keeps its officials in office as long as they will stay or as long as they serve the convictions of their constituents; a city which makes its enterprises pay, and pay big, and watches its finances as prudently as the most conservative banking house; a city in which it is the ambition of every citizen to serve without pay and without return save in the approval of his fellow-citizens.

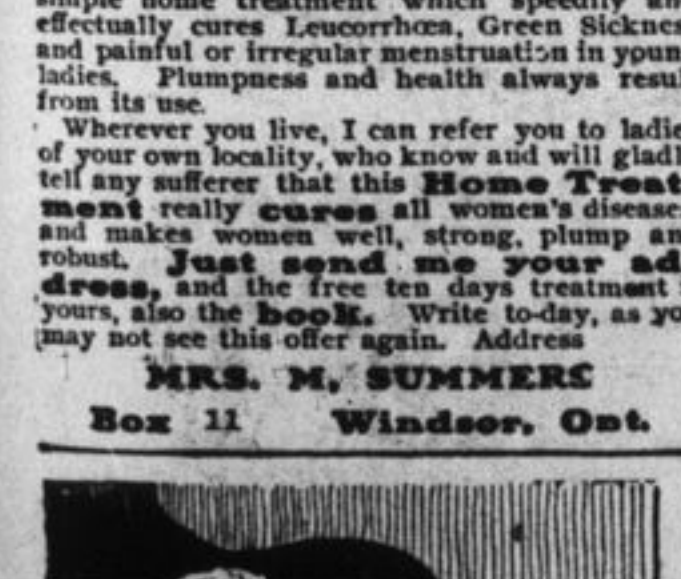

#### ROYALTY LOSES JEWELS.

Our King Also Lost a Fox Terrier.

Members of royal families are as likely to lose valuable articles as other people, although they do not advertise as frequently in the newspapers.

Only a few months ago Queen Alexandra of England, missed a highly prized memento, in the shape of a diamond-set miniature of the late Queen Victoria. Detective agencies set to work, but the locket was returned through the honesty of a railroad policeman, who found the missing article in the station where the queen had recently alighted from a train. He received a reward of \$5.

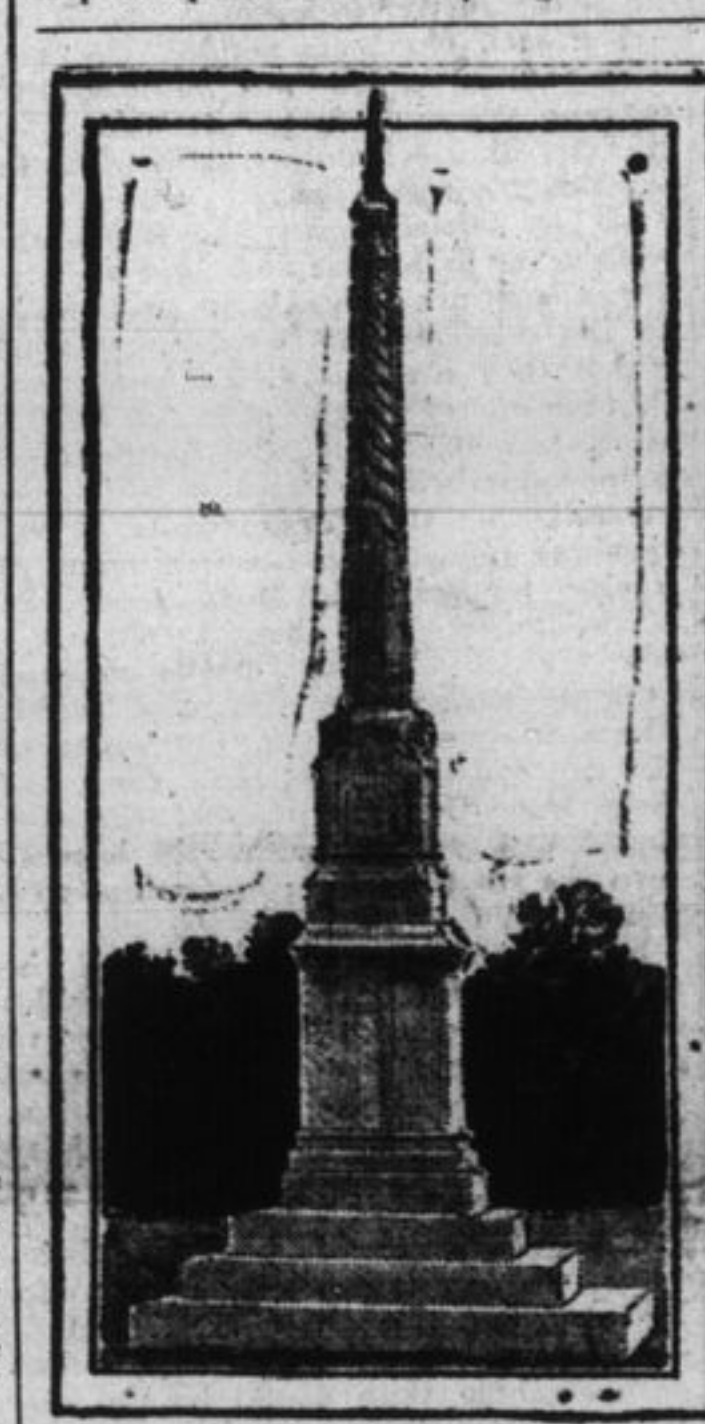

#### SWEETS FOR CHILDREN.

The Old Theories Are Being Discarded. The old theory that sugar is deleterious for children is now exploded, the latest dictum of food specialists being that it is a food especially adapted to children, because of their great activity, says an exchange. The amount of sugar to be given and the form in which it is to be supplied are still questions of much importance. Until a child reaches its second year the natural sugar in the milk supplies all that is necessary, but after that sweets of a wholesome nature eaten at regular meals are considered beneficial. Most people still agree that sugar should not be used with the breakfast, but it is better furnished in simple puddings, custards, cookies, loaf sugar or home-made candy. Sweet fruits, such as figs and dates, are exceedingly wholesome, and should be freely furnished.

for the piers it lets them have, does not pay, and that it meant the killing of the goose that was laying some very fine eggs for the city. Some of the companies began to make active and vigorous efforts to get piers elsewhere, and it was not at all improbable that Philadelphia, New York, Boston, Baltimore and New Orleans might get the huge vessels. But a change has come over the dreams of the city authorities, and instead of the pier, the big lines are now subjects from which to squeeze money, they have begun to revise their rates and have given the steamship lines to understand that they wish to be considered their friends, and to return them at home, with lighter rents, and additional privileges. Trade will adjust these matters, no matter what Tammany says, and so Tammany is obliged to crawl down and try to keep trade it was reckless trifling with.

Fifth avenue bids fair to lose some of its beauty, if the raid now being made on encroaching fronts goes on. Now, that the courts have decided that the city is entitled to the land taken by the porch and pillars of the Knickerbocker Trust company building, the corporation counsel has his eye on all property similarly situated, and has decided that nearly all the big Fifth avenue hotels, including the Waldorf-Astoria, and others like it, have to cut off their fronts in the shape of porches and stoops and come within the legal line. The corporation counsel means to law to the line, and will shave off the encroachments with a sharp legal axe, and bring the city into its own once more. It seems a pity that such handsome buildings should be disfigured, but possibly the change in front may be an improvement after all. At any rate the public is beginning to note with much pleasure that there is no foot in city operations a movement to stop all encroachments upon the public. The rights of the foot passenger are now being protected, and unreasonably truck drivers, and merchants holding too much of the public space, are being brought to the sense that pedestrians have the right of way, and drivers must not think they have a right to run over men and women, whom they find in their way, while merchants are being compelled to give the travelling public as much of the sidewalks as is needed. In the case against the Knickerbocker Trust company, the corporation counsel contended that the city is entitled to a thirty-foot sidewalk, and the court sustained the contention. It has developed that Mayor McClellan has a plan to widen the roadway on Fifth avenue, and in that case he wants more
