The One Worthy Act.

The appointment of J. A. Macdonald, the gifted editor of the Globe, to a place on the board of governors of Toronto University, has been favourably commented on. It leads one to expect that it serves to convince the people of the premier's good faith in administering the trust committed to him, and "strengthens the conviction that the electors acted wisely in dismissing the Ross government and in summoning the conservatives to power."

The government deserves no special praise in preserving the non-political aspect of the university's management, but Mr. Whitney did exhibit sound sense when he called Mr. Macdonald to his counsel. He is, perhaps, the foremost writer in political journalism, and is not only forceful but fair in all his discussions. When the Whitney government has merited consideration from the press it has been accorded by the Globe, but when it has merited criticism it has come with keenness and effect. The honor conferred upon Mr. Macdonald is appreciated by all pressmen.

But one worthy act on the part of the local government does not atone for many that have been unworthy. The government, so far as it has acted in the advice of commissions, which have done their work at great expense to the province, has done well, but so far as it has listened to the evil promptings of the spoilsman has sinned most grievously. The call to a place of honor of one man, a representative of the opposition press, is not an offset for the dismissals from office, some of them under circumstances that do not permit of defence. The more recent cases are the more flagrant because they are supposed to be justified by trials or hearings, the verdicts of which are simply scandalous.

And this case of Mr. Macdonald is regarded as an evidence of Mr. Whitney's wisdom and discrimination, eh? It is this so far as it goes, but it is not a cover for all the indignities to which the government has committed since it has had an opportunity to do things.

Sunday Bill Is Passing.

The Lord's Day bill is going through the Commons. It will presently reach the Senate, there to run the gauntlet of a fresh dissection. The measure is composite in its character. It represents the reflections of many minds, and yet it is not generally acceptable.

As the discussion upon it progressed it became evident that all classes, sects and parties were divided respecting it. There was an active minority in any case, and yet in every division of the house, the clauses which passed had the support of a large majority.

The debate centred upon three features. The first had reference to shooting on Sunday, whether at targets, at turkeys or birds, for pleasure or for gain. The main object was not to disturb any one in his devotions.

The second point was the right to import, to expose or sell, secular papers on Sunday. The news agents in the larger cities complained that to prevent tourists having their Sunday papers would interfere with travel in Canada. But the argument prevailed that as Sunday papers could not be published in Canada they should not be imported and sold in it. The decision rests on sound logic.

The third point was as to whether a concession should be made to the Hebrews who observed their rest day on Saturday, and who should not be forced to suspend business or work on two days. There was consideration for the Jews, the Seventh Day Adventists, and others, who, without desiring to differ from the majority, sought the privilege of resting on one day a week, and the one of their choice.

At length the house voted on the question. There were several amendments, but all were defeated, and the bill passed as drafted by the committee, with one rest day, Sunday, the first day of the week. Mr. Aylesworth expressed the mind of the majority by declaring that Christianity should be recognized as a part of the law of Canada.

Some fault was found with the Lord's Day Alliance, because of its active service in the lobbies of the house. The alliance represents a moral sentiment on the community, and its agents, in expressing that sentiment and seeking to have it embodied in the law of the land, will be very cordially endorsed.

The McBride government, British Columbia, contemplates an early appeal to the electors. With its record of deals it merits banishment at the hands of the people.

Evidence Of Their Degeneracy.

The Thaw-White event has prompted serious study, and from the light which has been poured upon the case one is moved to moralize as to the degeneracy of the race. Both these men were degenerates. Both were born into luxury, and through the years pursued the course that catered most to their sensuous desires.

White, distinguished in his profession and easy in circumstances, is described as a voluptuary and libertine. While he maintained two homes, one in New York and one on Long Island, his affections were not in them, or with his family. He had two resorts, the associations of which were of the most questionable kind, and such were his excesses that the police shadowed him, suspecting gross immorality and seeking the evidence that would put an end to them.

One of his early beneficiaries was Evelyn Nesbit, the artist's model and chorus girl, whom he picked up and schooled and dressed for self-evident purposes. He is alleged to have boasted of his relations with her before her marriage with Thaw, and probably the murder is the direct outcome of language written or spoken and reflecting upon the character of this woman.

The murderer is the son of a Pittsburgh millionaire, who left him a fortune with the proviso, however, that he would only inherit it when he reached a certain age. His mother spoiled him by increasing his allowance to \$80,000 a year, and with nothing to do, no object but to amuse himself, he abandoned himself to dissipation of every kind. Fittingly enough he took up with the chorus girls and became the worshipper of Miss Nesbit. He chased her over Europe. Eventually he married her, once abroad and once at home, and is credited with being madly, insanely in love with her.

High society has been shocked by the indignities cast upon the prisoner. He was arrested, handcuffed, photographed, searched, and handled like any other murderer. He submitted to it very reluctantly. He is being sympathized with by many. His family have rallied to his side and will spend millions, if necessary, in his defence. Less money, and more work would have been his salvation. The parents that bring up their sons to be idlers and loafers are making for their ruin. The mind and body must be used, and the more helpfully and profitably the better. To pet and hamper them, and turn them loose on country and the world, is to invite the crime and scandal of which the White-Thaw case promises to give the people a surfeit.

Now let the new club for the protection of game birds and fishes go to work and show what it can do. The government will not dare to ignore its representations.

"Toronto the good," is a motto of the past. The civic scandals, including the last one which has just been uncovered, has brought it a new title, "Toronto the crooked."

The doctors who examined young Thaw in the Tombs did not find him insane. That he is a degenerate goes without saying. But it is not claimed that idleness and luxury have destroyed his reason.

The special auditor of St. Thomas' books has been told in letters that the writers knew "there was crookedness at the City hall." The city needs a permanent auditor, with the respect and backing of the council.

Many slaughter houses in Philadelphia have been abandoned because they have been unsanitary and a prejudice to the public health. And all this has been discovered suddenly. The muck-rake is a most useful article.

Mr. Jury is again talking in Winnipeg. He has said enough. What he wants is not so much a purification of the public service as a gratification of revenge. The people have heard enough about his quarrels with Mr. Preston.

The rich do not learn lessons from the times. Fathers and mothers who read of Thaw's fall should see the wisdom of making their children industrious and useful. A plethora of cash and a want of occupation will spoil anyone.

Chief Justice Fitzpatrick is a democrat up to the hilt. He drove down to the senate, walked in, took the speaker's chair, and approved of 500 acts, and walked out with a pleasant good morning. He put an end to the vanities which his predecessors entertained respecting the throne.

Ninead Falls, Ont., power will be delivered at Syracuse on Saturday.

The troops of the colors will be viewed by King Edward at London; to-day.

Capitalists are seeking to secure an electric railway franchise in Prince Albert, Sask.

Rev. Dr. O'Boyle, secretary of Ottawa University, is to be removed to British Columbia.

The insurance commission, sitting in London, Ont., heard evidence regarding the London Life.

North Ontario conservatives have nominated Capt. Samuel Sharpe, Uxbridge, for the commons.

Frank Daville, mayor of Aurora, is to be sheriff of York county to succeed the late Dr. J. H. Widdifield.

Jeremiah Eblner, a New York plumber, was rescued from a sand pit after twenty-two hours' imprisonment.

E. Stoneman, Columbus, Ohio, president of the North American Lead company, was killed in an automobile accident.

East Elgin liberals have nominated W. F. Hepburn for the vacancy in the commons, caused by A. B. Ingram's retirement.

The Montreal street railway is arranging during the next two months to give free trolley rides to the poor children of the city.

The Hudson Bay company has given a bonus of ten per cent. of salary to every employee who has been in the service for a year.

Crop reports from the west concur in saying that the G.P.R. agents agree that everything points to a splendid wheat harvest.

The Dominion government, it is officially announced, has an intention of selling the military training grounds at Niagara-on-the-Lake.

In Toronto there are not over 2,000 houses that rent at \$10 or less, while there are over 22,000 workmen who earn \$12 a week or less.

The Montreal lawyers who defended James T. Hackett, recently sentenced to twenty-five years' imprisonment, will ask for a new trial in September.

BOTH ARMS CRUSHED.

A Sad Accident in the Imperial Laundry.

Last evening, Eda Wollsey, a young girl, who has been working at the Imperial laundry for the past three weeks, met with a very serious accident which will possibly result in the loss of both arms. She was standing under a window, and while looking out, turned around and put her hand on one of the mangles, and was immediately drawn in between the rollers. In trying to save it from further harm the unfortunate girl had her other hand drawn between the unfeeling metal. Both were badly crushed almost to the elbow. With great presence of mind Charles Gray, the manager, rushed to check the mangle, and by that means no doubt saved the girl from further injury. Dr. McCarthy was quickly summoned, and until his arrival every care was taken of the injured girl. She was conveyed to the hospital later, where she is being nursed as well as could be expected.

KING'S BIRTHDAY HONORS.

Several Canadians Honored With Decorations.

London, June 29.—A long list of King's birthday honors is announced. A number of Canadians are honored with decorations. The order of knighthood is conferred upon Amelius Irving K.C., of Toronto, and Chief Justice Wetherby, of Nova Scotia.

The order of commandeur of St. Michael and St. George is bestowed on W. L. M. King, deputy minister of labor, and Hon. A. Turcotte, Sir Charles Parsons, commanding the regular forces in Canada, and an ordinary member of the military division of the third class of the Compendium of the Bath.

La B. F. Fraser, chief clerk in the department of justice; L. K. Jones, secretary to the department of railways; De Saint Denis Lemoine, sergeant-at-arms in the senate; Joseph Pope, under secretary of state, and Edward Sutherland, assistant auditor-general, are all appointed to the imperial service order.
