BOMB SUPPLY

Always Plenty for Anarchists' Use.

FILLED WITH SCRAPS

RUSSIA FOUNTAIN HEAD OF MANUFACTURE.

Some Imported Inside Oranges—Many Varieties of the Infernal Machines—Allens Art Should Be Absolutely Inflexible.

London, June 30.—The outrage at Madrid and the plot at Basna against King Victor of Italy, have once more brought before the public the extraordinary activity of the various "bomb factories" in Europe.

It is estimated that at the present moment there must be many hundreds of bombs—if not thousands—in Russia alone. They are about the size of an orange, and they weigh at first, until the authorities wote to the fact—imported into Russia inside the oranges, the contents of the fruit having been, of course, carefully removed. Most people who have lived any time in Russia know all about these bombs, and it is not difficult to secure an opportunity of handling them when once one is in the possession of the possession. For the most part they are kept under lock and key—ready for emergencies.

REMARKABLE FEAT

Travels 3,000 Miles to Clear His Name—Man Throws Up Job in America to Vindicate Honor in England.

London, June 30.—A voyage of 3,000 miles to clear his name from the suspicion of a crime, is the remarkable feat of a man named William Fleming of Scarborough.

AN ENGINEERING MARVEL

Will Be New C.P.R. Bridge, Near Lethbridge.

Detroit, Mich., June 29.—A Chicago despatch says plans have been perfected by the Canadian Pacific to construct a bridge near Lethbridge, Alberta, which will be an engineering marvel, and probably will be ranked as one of the world's wonders. The plans call for a structure slightly more than a mile long, and 300 feet above the water level. The Canadian Pacific bridge will span the Belly River, and is to be built for the purpose of shortening the route between Lethbridge and Meleod. The grade of the new line will be much easier and heavy loads can be carried at less cost. The work will be commenced at once.

REGIMENT DEGRADED

By Cast for Declaring Sympathy With Radicals.

St. Petersburg, June 30.—Emperor Nicholas, according to reliable information, summoned the Proebrensky regiment before the imperial palace at Peterhof, yesterday, and, in a sarcastic address, expressed his regret at the evidence of the regiment's disloyalty in declaring sympathy with the radical programme of parliament. The emperor concluded by saying he never again would wear the uniform of that regiment. The regiment has been degraded by being transformed to a special infantry battalion, and all the privileges pertaining to regiments of guards have been withdrawn from it.

But Convicts Were Shot As They Ran.

UP-SHOT OF CONFLICT

FIVE ARE DEAD AND MANY WOUNDED.

The Plot Planned as the Prisoners Worked in the Tailor Shop—The Indian Warden Had His Throat Cut—The Desperate Conflict That Ensued.

Shanghai, June 30.—A desperate attempt to escape was made, yesterday, by the prisoners of the Wayside convict station, and five men were shot dead and several badly wounded before it was quelled.

W. D. Blennerhasset, one of the English prison officials, and several Indian warders were seriously injured.

WHOLESALE SUICIDE

How a Tribe Faced Starvation in Siberia.

St. Petersburg, June 30.—A ghastly story comes from Yakutsk district of the river Onon in a settlement of Chookchees, an Americano-Asiatic tribe, whose physical type and language he speak them to be superior to many of the Siberian semi-nomadic peoples. These Chookchees are out a livelihood by reindeer breeding; some individuals possessing three or four hundred, and others several thousand head of horned cattle. This industry is liable to extreme vicissitudes, owing especially to the frequent plagues, and two years ago the cattle post swept away every reindeer in the settlement. The Chookchees are Animists, worshippers of the lords of the forests, the rivers, the fire and the stars, and are addicted to murder and suicide. Folks when old frequently kill themselves, or are killed by their affectionate relatives. Having lost their possessions, the Chookchees endured hunger and cold, hoping for relief after the winter, but when the snow and ice thawed, and the green grass sprouted, and yet no succor came, and death by hunger confronted them, they assembled to consider the question, and having talked together the whole day, they decided that each head of a house should kill first all the members of the family and then himself. On the following morning this resolution was duly carried out. Side by side lay the wretched victims, most of them with their throats cut, chests slit open, and hearts and livers removed, as is customary with the Chookchees, who a few years ago numbered only a couple of thousand. It is told. The tribe is now almost extinct.
