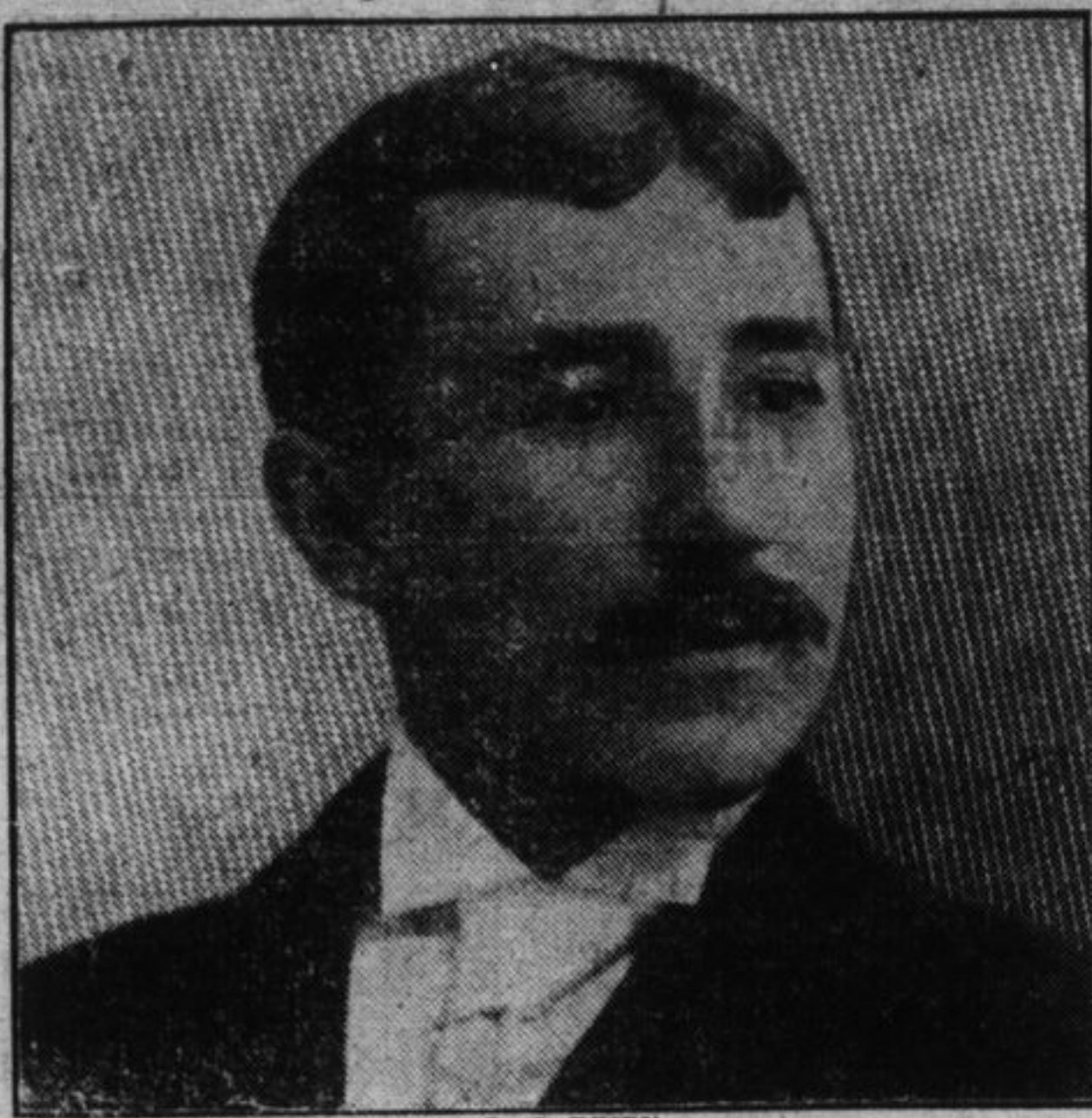

United States congress adjourned, to-day, after a remarkably strenuous session.

Thomas E. Waggaman, of Washington, former treasurer of Catholic University, died of cancer near Annapolis, Md.

A collision occurred on the trolley at North Albany, N.Y., on Friday night, in which sixteen persons were injured, two seriously.

A mysterious epidemic of profuse perspiration followed by prostration and eruption of the skin, has broken out near Paris, France.
