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Any even numbered section of Dominton Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres more or less. homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior.
Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of (1) at least six months residence upon

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS. Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or com-pany. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output. Quartz—A free miner's certificate is

granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may, locate a claim 1,500x1,
500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the elaim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a royalty of 2½ per cent on the sales.

PLACER mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable

A free miner may obtain two leases to redge for gold of five miles each for dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lesses shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental, \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2½ per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
