CAUGHT FIRE

Queen's Medical Building Badly Wrecked.

FIREMEN KEPT BUSY

IN KEEPING FLAMES WITHIN THE STRUCTURE.

The Valuable Laboratories Were Destroyed—Few of the Effects Beyond the Secretary-Treasurer's Books Saved—The Value of the Property and Insurance Carried.

Queen's Medical College was almost completely gutted by fire, this morning, and, with it, the contents including the excellent library of medical works and many valuable instruments.

The cause of the fire was one of those accidents, free of all blame to any one, that will happen at times in the best regulated concerns. It originated in what might be called the public health department of Eastern Ontario.

In the laboratory thereof are a number of little, let us call them, gas chafers, for that is the easiest description. Beneath these incubators a gas flame is continuously burning, that the heat within may be kept uniformly high and the bacterial culture tubes, etc., enabled to mature that the specimens may then be examined.
