Matters That Interest Everybody.—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The Port Hope municipal lighting by-law was defeated by seventy-five votes.

Five boys were killed and nine injured by a dynamite explosion at Wanamans, Pa.

At Oswego, N.Y., on July 4th, entertained the largest crowd that ever invaded her precincts.

Charles D. Fuller, a Buffalo, N.Y., policeman, had his right hand blown by a dynamite explosion.

At Buffalo, Prof. Henry A. Ward, Chicago, the well-known naturalist, was struck by an automobile and killed.

A. P. Murray, employed by the New York Air Brake company, Watertown, N.Y., was found dead in bed from heart failure.

At Oswego, N.Y., Morray Kites, thirteen years of age, was accidentally shot and killed by Frederick Parker, a companion.

With four holes up, George S. Lyon, Toronto, led Douglas Laird in the first round for the amateur golf championship of Canada.

A young immigrant, Arthur Edmondson, drank gopher poison at Darlington, Man., with suicidal intent, and probably died.

Douglas McCallum, caught in a belt and whirled round a shaft at Trewley's saw-mill in Wainfleet, Ont., has died of his injuries.

The election of Count Boni de Castellane has been annulled by the chamber of deputies, on the ground of corruption and bribery.

At Syracuse, N. Y., a giant fire-cracker, which prematurely exploded, blew off the thumb and index finger of the right hand of Michael Moral.

Miss Kenney and the other women suffragist disturbers of the peace in London, have all gone to prison, rather than agree to behave themselves in future.

At Wimbledon, Eng., Miss Sutton, California, today, lost the tennis championship of Great Britain, when she won, last year, being defeated by Mrs. Douglas.

The marriage of Miss Mona Williams, Port Hope, to Harold Branton, Edmonton, took place, today, at St. Mark's church, Port Hope, Ont., and was strikingly pretty.

The Ontario government is preparing, when the same comes, to retire President London, of Toronto University, on an allowance equal to his present salary, namely, \$5,000.

Pressure will be brought to secure a pardon for Frank G. Biglow, the defaulting Milwaukee broker, serving a sentence at the federal prison, Leavenworth, Kan. It is said that the prisoner's health is failing.
