Tobacco In China. Washington, D.C., July 5.—In reply to many inquiries from this country as to the possibility of building up a trade in American leaf tobacco in China, Consul George E. Anderson has sent a reply, which he says: "Already there is considerable business done in foreign leaf, Shanghai alone importing \$150,000 worth last year, but this business is not a native Chinese trade."

When it is considered that the same port imported through the customs alone \$1,200,000 worth of prepared native leaf and \$333,000 worth of native leaf, with probably a similar or even a greater amount of each imported through the illicit routes, it can be seen that the real tobacco trade of China is enormous.

The greater portion of the tobacco consumption gets into the trade reports for the leaf is produced largely among the mulberry trees, eared, and consumed on the farms or in the village.

KING HAD KISSED JEWEL

Which Slays Unworthy Wearer and Saves the Good.

Madrid, July 7.—"It was a miracle due to the ring," Queen Mercedes which saves our King, and the Spaniards now when discussing the recent bomb outrage.

The ring which they refer to is placed upon the finger of the statue of the Virgin in the cathedral here, and a curious story is attached to it.

Queen Mercedes received the ring from King Alfonso XII, and when she later she died. The king took it back and gave it to another member of the royal family, who died shortly after. Two more persons received the fatal jewel, and each died soon after putting it on.

Then the king feared to give it to anyone else, and decided to keep it himself. Three months later the throne of Spain was vacant. After that the ring was placed upon the finger of the statue.

The ring is believed by the people to be one of the mysterious powers. It slays immediately those who are not worthy to wear it and will bring prosperity to the reign of the virtuous. King Alfonso, besides assuring him a long life.

On the eve of his marriage King Alfonso was seen to pluck a grey hair from the crown of his head.

The crown was placed on the crown of the Virgin in the cathedral, and before leaving the church he touched the ring with his lips. This, the Spaniards believe, is why the crown was not blown away in the terrible catastrophe which marked his wedding day.
