COTTON MILL STRIKE

AT MAGOG WAS FURTHER ENLARGED.

By the Print Workers Going Out on Sympathy—Company Will Pay Increase in Wages, But Will Not Recognize the Union.

Magog, Que., July 7.—The strike of the cotton mill employees of the Dominion Textile company, still continues, and the tension between the company and the strikers is still further increased by the fact that the great majority of the print workers operative went out, yesterday, out of sympathy with those already out. As a result, the whole mill is silent, save for the engraving room and print room. These still are kept running, as they are not so directly dependent upon the cotton mill as the other rooms. However, they will soon be reached between the company and the strikers.

Numerous meetings of the employees have been held and numerous communications between company and strikers have taken place, but met with no result, other than hard feeling. Before it was thought that the print workers' department would go out, a message was communicated to them from the company, stating that whatever increase was granted to the cotton mill operators would also be granted to them. Nevertheless, this seemed to have a reverse effect, as they all marched out at noon the same day. By this it will be seen that, although the company still holds firm in its decision not to recognize the union, they are, as previously stated, still willing to hold to their promise of giving an increase in wages.

There is a faint hope that all may be settled next week, as this state of affairs is only resulting in a loss to both parties. This fact is giving some hope to the strikers, as they consider that the company stand to lose more than they, but it should be remembered that they are also better able to withstand it.

As yet the company has not attempted to import operators to break the strike. The strikers are making their headquarters at the Fairview hall, while the officials of the company are always to be found at their office at the factory.

AN OLD VETERAN.

Young Mr. Roosevelt kept his whereabouts very quiet and did not register at any hotel for the special purpose of keeping his presence unknown. Young Roosevelt, who is a member of the college Itoy free on his vacation for the summer and seemed to be having lots of fun.

A Steamer's Arrival.  
Quebec, July 7.—The I.R.S. Empress of Ireland, Capt. Caroy, from Liverpool, with 276 passengers and a general cargo, arrived in port, at five o'clock, this morning. It is the maiden trip of this magnificent steamer, and was a success throughout. She was unfortunately delayed fifteen hours by fog in the gulf. The Black Duke band, which was on board, will give concerts, this afternoon and to-night, at the Auditorium. They will give a recital at Three Rivers, to-morrow night, and arrive in Montreal on Monday.

Willetsholme Items.  
Willetsholme, July 6.—Only a few of the farmers have begun haymaking as yet. The local Orange lodge will assemble in a body in Woodburn church on Sabbath next, and Rev. Mr. Calvert will devote the service chiefly to them. Alfred Curtis realized a good fortune for his team of horses, sold recently. Miss Nettie Bennett has gone to Waterbury for a few days. Charles Shook is moving into his new house, this week. The Mary Wilton is at home for vacation. John Boyd is seriously ill. The stone-cruiser is in this neighborhood.

Seeking Damages.  
Toronto, July 7.—John Brown, Toronto Junction, is suing a citizen of the Toronto Railway company, because the company ran its cars in Toronto Junction on Sunday, June 24th. He claims that under the act of the company cannot run cars in the junction on Sunday, and he claims penalty damages of \$40,000 or \$100 for each car run.

A Sudden Death.  
Norwood, Ont., July 7.—Alexander Baptie, a sawyer, in W. C. Harrison's mill, here, died very suddenly, about four o'clock, this morning. His wife was awakened by a strong noise in his throat; not being able to waken him, she sent for a doctor, but before he arrived Mr. Baptie was dead. He leaves a widow and two small children.

Asking Big Figures.  
Toronto, July 7.—The annual meeting of the Ontario Medical College was concluded, this morning. The only matter discussed was the proposed new building, and it was pointed out that property owners were asking prohibitive prices for available sites. The building committee received full power to deal with the matter.

Value Of The Rabbit.  
Melbourne, July 7.—It was stated yesterday, at a public meeting that \$1,000,000 worth of rabbits were shipped to England every year; that the rabbit, as a commercial commodity, was "only in its infancy" and that the trade would probably grow to \$5,000,000 a year.

Hailstones Kill Child.  
Valencia, Spain, July 7.—A hailstorm has killed one child and injured fifty persons. Hailstones as big as oranges smashed the roofs of houses, causing the inhabitants to take refuge in the cellars. The crops in many districts were destroyed and great distress prevails. Relief is urgently requested.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Fourth of July statistics: Killed, 51; injured, 3,551.  
The Allan steamer, Sardinian, sailed from Montreal at 3:45 a.m.  
The Allan steamer Mongolian, sailed from Glasgow on July 7th.  
The schooner George Edwin, coal laden for Fredericton, N.B., founded.  
The Allan steamer Carthagean, for Montreal, sailed from London on July 7th.  
Twenty-five Cosacs surrounded a bomb factory which blew up, killing nine.  
Prof. Engel, one of the most famous teachers of law of his time, is dead.  
Complaint that victims of Salisbury were robbed, has been withdrawn.  
The Allan steamer Carthagean, from Montreal, docked at London, on July 7th.

Chicago association of the packers good but disapproves of many things.  
Mrs. Thaw, mother of Harry Thaw, the murderer of Architect White, has sailed from England for New York.  
At Pottsville, Pa., Emma Stephany, a young Welsh girl, confessed to the killing of her sweetheart, James Prizell.  
The recruits of the Illinois naval reserves were drowned on Thursday night, through the capsizing of the boat.  
Russia is said to be putting her attention in order to get loans. The revelation caused a sensation in the dooms.

The corner stone of the new Victoria avenue Baptist church, Belleville, was laid by H. A. Hodgson, Montreal.  
There is a warrant out for the arrest of John C. Cayendish, "Lord Douglas," an alleged bigamist, of New York.  
The bodies of Messrs. Barwick and Pipon left Southampton, to-day, on the steamer Minneapolis for New York, this to-morrow.  
At Trenton, N.J., Charles Davenport was found guilty of attempting to poison his young daughter, Josephine, about two months ago.  
The mutiny of troops at Batum has ended. The ringleaders escaped, whereupon their followers yielded, and are confined in the fortress.

Dr. Alex. Chilton, Castleton, was found guilty by the medical council of unprofessional conduct. He will appeal from the judgment.  
In a junior C.L.A. match at Collingwood, the Allstars defeated Collingwood by the score of two goals to one. The match was very closely contested.  
Turkish cavalry troop of a thousand men, which has seized the frontier points in dispute with Persia, have been driven back with losses by a Persian force.  
A big vessel signalled for help near New London, Conn., on account of fire. The crew got it under control before tugs could reach the vessel, which got under way and departed.

The final match in the western football association was played at Midway and Preston, resulting in a victory for Midway by score of 3 to 1.  
John Meigs, a contractor, died in London, July 3rd. She was one of the oldest members of the American colony and lived in London for thirty years.  
John Wilson, a foreman of the Don Valley Brick company, Toronto, Ont., was found, early this morning, by a watchman, lying dead in front of one of the houses. Heart failure was the cause of death.  
At Lafayette, Ind., Mrs. Sarah Gobba and her six children were burned to death last night in a fire that destroyed the home. Solomon Gobba, the husband, and father, was burned, but will recover.

The widow of Stanford White, New York, was paid, yesterday, by a life insurance company, \$149,040, which was the value of a single policy Mr. White had carried on his life for several years.  
Harrison Terrell, known throughout the United States during the war as years of the life of General Grant as his faithful attendant and nurse in New York and Mount McGregor, died in Washington Thursday last.

The continued warring of the Zulus has infuriated the troops in the field against them, and they are being given no quarter. They nearly exterminated the detachment of colonial troops, and the white men have been tortured hideously.  
The chief of police of Altona and Deputy Councillor Rosenhagen are inquiring into the case of August Rosenberg, of Seattle, Wash., recently arrested at Altona, who is strongly suspected of having planned an attempt on Emperor William's life.

John Morley, secretary for India in the House of Commons, stated that the government had refused Sven Hedin, the Swedish explorer, permission to enter the Tibet. The house had refused Britishers and what was refused them could not be granted to foreigners.  
The Canadian Northern railway has closed a contract with J. T. Scheil, M.P., for Glengarry, for the construction of a branch line, from Hawkesbury to Ottawa, a distance of fifty-five miles. Work will commence next week, and it is hoped to have the rails laid this fall.
