The city council has not yet answered the application of the association. Its officers feel that they cannot, for the fourth year in succession, canvass the citizens for funds, It is not fair to the officers nor to the usual small class of liberal givers. Further, the Victoria day committee have interfered seriously with a canvass. Subscriptions were given with the understanding that they were to cover the Old Boys' reception as well as Victoria day, and these people cannot be asked again. The Old Boys' legitimate share has been appropriated by the other committee. There has no lack of spirit in the recep tions to home-comers, and the committees are not deserving of the treat ment they are receiving.


