HIS PERSONAL PROPERTY.

King Leopold Claims All Rights in Congo.



Brussels, July 10.-King Leopold sets forth his personal claims to the Congo Free State in two letters which are published in the official Bulletin. "The burden and the responsibility for this state," writes his majesty to the secretaries general of the state, "have fallen on me alone, and the constitution of the Congo is my personal achievement." He proclaims his rights to it.

A Singular Criminal Law.

A few days ago the murderer of Mr. Reid, the Paisley man, who mysteriously disappeared from Heidelberg last July, having been arrested in Austria, was tried at Feldkirch, and was convicted and sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment. The case illustrates a singularity of the Austrian criminal law, to which the Manchester Guardian calls attention. Generally a presumed murderer is punishable by death in Austria, but in cases where between the time of the murder and the arrest the prisoner has been punished for some other crime a sentence of capital punishment cannot be passed upon him. In this case the murderer had served a week's imprisonment for petty theft about January of this year, and to this circumstance alone he is indebted for his life.

Town To Be Honored.

President Roosevelt is to have a town named after him. It is to be one of six towns to be established in Comanche county, Oklahoma. The town will be located on the site used for the camping ground of President Roosevelt during his recent visit in Oklahoma and will be named "Theodore." The story goes that a Roosevelt statue is to be built on the exact spot where the president's tent stood and that it will be constructed of Wichita mountain granite and consist of a double base and a column about fifty feet high.
