COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

The Iron Trade Review reports closing of second half of the year without trade of recent hesitancy.

It is estimated that United States Steel Trust earnings for the June quarter will run over \$38,000,000.

The first sale of cotton to be shipped from the 1906 crop in the United States is on its way to New Orleans from Brownsville.

The June sales of the Canada North-West Land company were 15,235 acres for \$57,655, compared with 15,083 for \$57,008 last year.

The Dominion Coal company's output for June was \$25,999 tons; shipments, \$22,011 tons. The scarcity of unskilled labor still hampers the output.

A million dollar dry dock is being planned for St. John's N.B. It is said that the contract has been given to a large Canadian firm, whose name is for the present withheld, and that work on it will begin in September.

Many railroads closed their fiscal years on June 30th, and of those that did the Canadian Pacific takes the best record, an increase of no less than 21 per cent. The Hill system is next with 15 per cent, and Atchafalaya and Baltimore and Ohio at 14 per cent.

The Canadian Consolidated Rubber company has been formed with a capital of \$5,000,000, to merge the Canadian Rubber company and the Granby Rubber company. The Canadian Rubber company has controlling interest and George W. Stephens, M.P.P., will be the first president.

Cheese Markets.

Montreal, July 10.—Cheese prices are very strong and holders of most varieties are demanding 12c. to 12 1/2c. for Swiss cheese being 11c. to 11 1/2c. and Gouda 11c. to 11 1/2c.

AWFUL DREAD

Inside the Russian Imperial Palace.

BOMBS WERE FOUND

FILLED WITH DYNAMITE, IN THE GARDEN.

Trepoff Puts All Machinery to Work, But Culprit Not Yet Found—Car Guarded More Rigorously Than Ever, if Possible.

New York, July 11.—According to a St. Petersburg despatch to the World, there was wild consternation at the imperial palace, yesterday, following the discovery in the garden of the palace of several bombs filled with dynamite. The excitement and dread were indescribable, that the bombs must have been placed there by some one connected with the palace, either as guard or servant, and everyone was under suspicion.

Gen. Trepoff, the commandant, immediately put in motion all the machinery of his office to discover the culprit, but thus far without result. In the meantime the person of the czar is being more rigidly guarded than ever, and increased precaution taken, if this is possible.

Hoisted Red Flag.

St. Petersburg, July 11.—Two battleships, today, hoisted the red flag at Sebastopol. They are the Three Saints and the Partoisimon. Their crews are in mutiny and have established communication with the mutinied troops garrisoned in Batoum fortress.

Tried To Kill Him.

Sebastopol, July 11.—An attempt was made this afternoon, to assassinate Vice-Admiral Chouknin, commander of the Black Sea fleet. The admiral was wounded and taken to a hospital. Vice-Admiral Chouknin has been blamed for his severity.

KILLED IN CALIFORNIA.

Thomas Orr, Bowmanville, Crushed By Car.

San Diego, Cal., July 11.—Thomas Orr, an aged citizen of Bowmanville, Ont., was instantly killed last evening at Willow Brook, near Los Angeles, by being run over by a trolley car. He was seventy-six years of age and had travelled a hundred thousand miles without ever having met with an accident. He had been visiting friends at Willow Brook and was just stopping a moment to shake hands when the car struck him.

Brookville's Aspirations.

Brookville, Ont., July 11.—Brookville may be represented with a junior four-oared crew at the next Canadian Henley. Messrs. George Bailey, J. Pruden, Jr., A. Chapman and A. O'Donohue have started training for the event, and though the time is short, it is thought by faithful work they can possibly make a showing which will warrant sending them to compete for championship honors.

Boy Steals From Cripple.

Belleville, Ont., July 11.—A boy named Donohue, of this city, was apprehended this morning, charged with stealing \$21 from a cripple named Walter Burison, whom the boy and another lad were pushing round in a carriage. The cripple, who lives in a house in the city, had the money in his hat and the boy had spent most of the money when apprehended.

To Shoot On Friday.

Bisley, Eng., July 11.—On Friday the historic Kolapore cup will be shot for. For this teams representing Canada, the mother country, Guernsey, the Malay States Guides, Guernsey, have been entered. The Canadian team won last year. The fight should be between the mother country and Canada. The Transvaal and New Zealand, which had teams last year, are not represented this year.

Stabbed In A Row.

Chicago, July 11.—Judge Landis, in the United States district court, today, sentenced the Chicago & Alton road, which was recently convicted of granting illegal rebates, at Kansas City, to pay a fine of \$20,000 on each of two counts.
