CITY ASKED FOR SITE

For the Building of the Normal School. The civic finance committee has been called to meet at three o'clock to-morrow afternoon to discuss the question of a site for the Normal school. The minister of education expects that each city selected for a school will grant a site.

The board of education holds the lease of that whole block, from the Dominion government, and it is understood that an arrangement could be made between the board and the city for the central portion for the Normal school. The best way would be for the civic finance committee to have a conference with the property committee of the board of education.

YACHT CLUB HOUSE

WILL BE RE-OPENED ON THE 28TH.

Gananoque and Chamoune Clubs Invited to Participate in Races—A Dance Will be Held in the Evening.

At a meeting of the Yacht Club executive, last evening, arrangements were made for the re-opening of the club house. The date fixed was Saturday, July 28th. It was decided to have races in the afternoon for small classes, likely the twenty and sixteen footers, and to invite the yacht clubs of Gananoque and Chamoune (Watertown, N.Y.) to participate.

The club house, as raised a story and renovated, is greatly improved in view from the harbor. The dining-room, which was the new second floor, is one-third larger than before. Two verandahs, running around three sides, will afford lots of space for members and visitors on racing occasions. In two weeks time the house will be complete, and most creditable to the city.

The Summer's Racing. The Yacht Club regatta committee also met last evening. An invitation was received from the Pictou Club, which is holding a regatta on the 26th and 27th, asking that Kingston yachts participate. It is likely that a couple will respond to the request. Henry Cunningham's new sixteen-footer, the Baby Grand, is one that will enter.

MONTREAL ORANGEMEN Are Taking the Twelfth Very Quietly. Montreal, July 12.—The Orangemen of Montreal are holding no public celebration in Montreal, to-day, owing to the fact that they already had a public demonstration on Sunday last. A great many prominent men of the order have left the city, to take part in the demonstrations held throughout the various provinces of the Dominion to-day. This evening the local lodges will have private reunions to celebrate with song and speech the anniversary of the battle of the Boyne.

Toronto's Parade. Toronto, July 12.—The Twelfth of July Orange parade was smaller than usual, but it blocked all street car traffic on the principal streets of the city for quite an hour. The procession formed up in Queen's Park at eleven o'clock, and by one o'clock had reached the exhibition grounds, where open-air speeches were delivered. The chief marshal was W. S. Scragley, county D. of C., and the assistant marshal, W. J. Campbell, D. of C. centre district; W. H. Harper, D. of C. western district; Thomas Kingsley, D. of C. eastern district; and A. Goodfellow, D. of C. northern district.

Frederick Danforth, D. of C. William Lee, county secretary. Most of the British delegates to the triennial council were in the parade, including James E. Mackay, grand secretary of Ireland, and Edward Bradshaw, Belfast. Those from Scotland are R. DREYFUS VINDICATED. Entitled to Resume His Rank in the Army. Paris, July 12.—The supreme court, to-day, announced its decision annulling the condemnation of Capt. Dreyfus without re-trial. The accepted effect of the decision is a complete vindication of Dreyfus, entitling him to restoration to his rank in the army as though he had never been accused.

BRAKES WOULDN'T ACT And Many on Motor Car Were Killed. London, July 12.—Owing to the brakes failing to act, a motor omnibus, running from London to Brighton, dashed down a steep hill near Crawley, this morning, and was overturned. Six of the passengers were killed, and a score were badly injured, some of them probably sustaining fatal injuries.

An Action For Damages. An action for damages is likely to result from the accident to the lady, who had her hip broken yesterday by a youthful bicyclist, riding on a sidewalk, knocking her down, on Hogart street. The boy was breaking a city ordinance by riding on the walk.

Newark, N.J., July 11.—Mrs. J. Dougherty, of Brooklyn, who arrived last night at Brockton with her two young children, to spend the summer at their new cottage on Sharp's Rocks, Lake Hopatcong, went down to inspect their new boat-house, and waited for her husband, James Dougherty, a Brooklyn contractor, who was expected on a later train. Rose, the four-year-old daughter, fell into the

lake, and the mother jumped over the railing and plunged into the water, although she could not swim. They were both drowned. The other children ran to the house and gave the alarm. The bodies were later found in about ten feet of water.
