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MADE PRESIDENT

FOR TIME BEING OF TORONTO TO UNIVERSITY.

But He is Not a Candidate for the Office—Buckley Shop Men Say They Won't Go Into Business Again.

Toronto, July 12.—Prof. Maurice Hutton, president of the University of Toronto, at a meeting of the board of trustees, today announced that he is not a candidate for the presidency of the university.

It is understood, however, that Hutton is not a candidate for the presidency of the university.

Four bucket shop men made a public promise, in the police court, this morning, never to enter the business again in Ontario.

They were discharged, seven others charged with the same offence, and tried by jury at the fall session.

The preliminary hearing will take place before Magistrate Kingsmill tomorrow.

Charles Son & Co., a financial concern, of London, Eng., are pressing their claim against the Ontario government for brokerage, totalling \$16,000, which claim the government does not recognize.

Crimes in the administration. Criminal proceedings were to-day taken against those persons and firms who were named by Judge Winchester in his report of civic enquiry.

Summons were issued to-day against George Puddy and Henry Paddy, charged with inciting George B. Elliott to commit an indictable offence, this being the offering of money to a member of the council to procure a by-law for the Paddy abattoir; G. B. Elliott charged with bribing a member of the council; Adam M. Lynd, an ex-warden charged with accepting a bribe; Edward J. Lennox, architect, charged with obtaining \$200 from the city by false pretences, also on a charge of perjury; Edward J. Lennox, Joseph Wright, S. A. Clark, charged with conspiracy to defraud the city out of large sums of money upon city hall contracts; Bennett, also on a charge of conspiracy to raise the price of plumbing contracts; Bennett & Wright, A. S. A. Matthews, Wheeler & Bain and the Metallic Roofing Co., charged with conspiracy in connection with the galvanizing iron contracts; Charles Rogers, Sons & Co., the Office Specialty company, Canada Office and School Supply company, and G. X. Reynolds, charged with conspiracy in connection with the portable furnishing of the city hall.

DIVIDEND DECLARED.

Jolly Party is Off for Amherst, N.S.

Montreal, July 12.—The Montreal Light, Heat and Power company, today, declared a quarterly dividend of one and one-quarter per cent, which means an increase of from four to five per cent per annum.

When the marketing express pulled out of Bonaventure station, today, there was a jolly party in the official car. It consisted of Senator Mitchell, William Wainwright, W. H. Higney, selector general of the Grand Trunk, A. E. Mansfield, H. J. Logan, M.P., E. M. Mandel, M.P., J. T. Shearer and G. J. Adams. Their destination is Amherst, N. S., and from there they will go to the coal mines of the Maritime Coal Railway and Power company. Work has been well commenced on the new power house and transmission line at the Chignecto mines.

HUMAN SOCIETY'S WORK.

A Water Basin for Dogs Suggested.

It was pointed out, today, by a citizen, thoughtful in the interests of dumb animals, that which the Humane Society might well undertake would be to have a small basin attached to the large water trough on the market place, so dogs might drink. During the recent heat, today many canines sought this fountain for water; the larger ones could place their fore paws on the ledge and lap the water. The little dogs had to pass by, their thirst unsatisfied.

A small sum would supply this need, no doubt, now that the subject has been pointed out, the Humane Society will be up and doing.

Ten Killed by Landslide.

El Paso, Texas, July 12.—A cloudburst, July 10th, at Ocampo, Chihuahua, Mexico, accompanied by a landslide, washed away part of the city. Ten persons were killed and many injured. Col. W. C. Greene's office and corral, and the reduction works and office of the Watterston Mining company, were destroyed.

NERVE DISORDERS OF GREAT.

Famous Men Suffered From Incurable Diseases.

Of supreme captains of the world there are but six or seven, and scarcely one among them exhibits genius in his healthiest colors, says the London Times. In ambush for nearly all of them, some form of nerve disorder lurks. Some of the statements seem, degree, epilepsies, manifest in greater or less degree, revolves upon their destinies. Charlemagne, the great and wisest captain of the Franks, who stands for feudal civilization, who "snatched from darkness all the lands he conquered" and who reared an empire that no hand but his was able to control, in almost the sole exception.
