**HARRY THAW POOR HIS MOTHER MUST MEET DEFENCE BILL.**

His Father Led Him, But \$2,500 Per Annum—Miss Thomas Has Several Suits Pending Against the Prisoner.

New York, July 14.—Harry K. Thaw is reported to be without funds, and it is stated that the elaborate plans which have been made for his defence cannot be put into execution until the prisoner's mother, Mrs. William Thaw, of Pittsburgh, arrives from Europe, and approves the necessary expenditures.

Harry Thaw's income under his father's will is but \$2,500 a year, and all that Thaw has spent above this amount has come from his mother's purse.

In his inquiry into the past life of Thaw, Assistant District Attorney Garvan has secured from Joseph A. Shea, papers in a case in which Shea is counsel for Miss Ethel Thomas, who has several suits pending against the prisoner. The suits, given out of alleged former relations between Thaw and Miss Thomas. One specific charge is that of assault for which the plaintiff asks \$25,000 damages.
