

A JAPANESE ROMANCE.

Method Adopted to Secure Some Information.

London, July 18.-The Tokio co espondent of the Daily Telegraph i the authority for a remarkable story which throws an interesting light of the intricate methods employed by the Japanese in the secret service, For obvious reasons, no names are given in the story. A young and promising Japanese officer, of blameless character, was suddenly called upon by the chief of the staff to take up a life of dissipation in the interests of a state cause, which was not divulged. Obedience to superiors is the first law of the Japanese officer's life. Reluctantly the youth did as he was bid and in due time, repugnant though the whole proceeding was, he managest effectually, with sake and a geisha, to roin himself. He was spurned by his friends and turned out of the service. The chief of the staff then dispatched the broken man on a mission to neighboring country, where a firstclass power was engaged in a conflict with native rebels. His military genius soon made him the right-hand man of the native chief, and a price was placed upon his head. The Japanese government knew nothing of the affair, of course, but when the rebellion was suppressed the young officer returned to Japan with valuable in formation that, after some difficulty on his part, no doubt found its way to the government pigeon holes. Only the Oriental mind could conceive such an expedient for the advancement of patriotic interests. The correspondent does not state whether the young Japanese officer was reinstated, but vouches for the truthfulness of
