THE KING'S REGRETS

EXIGENCIES OF POSITION MAKE IT IMPOSSIBLE

Touched by the invitation—He Visited Dominion, However, He Would Have to Go to Other Colonies—The Official Reply.

Ottawa, July 18.—The king and queen are not to visit Canada. The text of his majesty's answer appears in an extra of the Canadian Gazette as follows:

"Dovering Street, July 7th, 1906.

"My Lord,—As requested in your lordship's despatch of May 25th, I have submitted to his majesty the joint address to the king from the senate and House of Commons of Canada, expressing their loyalty and devotion to his majesty and praying that his majesty and her majesty the queen will be graciously pleased to visit the dominion. His majesty has been pleased to receive the address very graciously.

"I must sincerely remind your lordship of two circumstances which must not be overlooked in the consideration of these proposals. In the first place, the current business of the empire, which is continuous and incessant, imposes a heavy tax on the time and strength of its sovereign—and it is well-known that the absence of his majesty from this country for any length of time is difficult, if not impossible, except under very definite limitations and restrictions—even when considerations of health and the need for comparative rest render it expedient.

"In the second place, it must be remembered that there are practically no limits, within the habitable globe, to the distances which must be travelled to reach all parts of the British empire, and that it would be difficult for the king to visit one important part of his dominions and decline to visit another.

"It was no doubt these two facts which influenced her late majesty, Queen Victoria, with wise foresight, to determine that her eldest son in his youth visit the various colonies and possessions of the empire, of which he was one day to become the ruler and, accordingly, his majesty, while Prince of Wales, paid the visit to Canada, to which reference is made in this address.

GATHERING INTEREST FOR HOMECOMERS' RECEPTION.

Give it a Push—Committee Will Do Best Thing Possible.—The Yacht Club Asked to Help—Memorial Service Suggested.

This morning, at the office of the president of the Kingston Old Boys' Association, a meeting for counsel was held. The mayor attended, the board of trade was represented and also the cab association. The situation caused by the absence of a civic grant, and the difficulty of making a fourth annual door-to-door collection, was discussed. It was resolved to do the best thing possible.

The board of trade was asked to provide for a band for the reception of the returning Ottawa excursion parties on the 25th. The mayor will call the Victoria Day committee together again to discuss a grant, in view of the collections having been accepted for the double event. The yacht club will be asked to forego one of their cruising trips for the public benefit and have their opening on building, races and sports on Monday, the 24th, instead of the very graceful concession, for thousands of people would be entertained.

The excursionists have again asked to be spared the loss of people on the station platform on arrival and to have the platform lighted. The request for relief from an absolutely dark night is a strange thing to have to ask for, landing of 1,000 passengers, of a transcontinental railway in a city in the twentieth century, after a depot has been established there for fifty years in the trust that General Manager Hays did not know of this badly equipped city station, the city will be asked to install a special set of lights for the night of the 24th. The mayor and the cab representative agreed, upon public and drivers' operation, to keep all the streets below Ontario street clear. This should be strictly carried out, to restore the city's credit for police authority, and for visitors, and citizens' freedom alike.

It was suggested that a memorial service would be appropriate in one of the Presbyterian churches on Sunday morning, for the lately deceased Toronto president and much-beloved former citizen, J. B. McKay, and for the eminent Canadian lately called "Tom," Alexander Muir, author of "The Maple Leaf," also a Kingstonian.

The Very Latest Called From All Over The World.

L. W. McIntyre, a former resident of Elgin county, died at Buffalo.

John Teple was badly injured at Hamilton by the caving in of a gravel pit.

Fifteen hundred people left for the west on the last homecomers' excursion.

The Allan steamer City of Vienna from Liverpool, has sailed from Philadelphia.

The Allan steamer Laurentian, from Glasgow, docked at Boston, at 5 p.m. on the 17th.

In a U. L. A. game played in Mount Pleasant, Arthur Tighe defeated the Lennoxes by a score of six to three. Thomas Rooney, Toronto, committed suicide at his boarding house by severing an artery in his arm with a razor.

A COMMON DELUSION.

Chloroform Responsible for Strange Visions.

Paris, July 18.—According to expert evidence given in a divorce case here, chloroform is productive of occultatory hallucinations in its recipient. A servant girl, who had been chloroformed for an operation, testified that as she recovered consciousness she saw the operating doctor kneeling before her. The doctor denied this statement, declaring that those who attached credence to the girl's story was ignorant of the nature of the drug. He called Drs. Debeye and Broutard, both eminent professors, to support him. They concurred in declaring that chloroform was well known to produce such impressions, which were not only frequent during anaesthesia, but often persist after consciousness has weakened. The servant had evidently been dreaming. The court accepted the evidence, and rejected the evidence of the doctor.

LANCASTER BANK ROBBERY.

Dead Burglar Was Pete Weir of Oshawa.

Toronto, July 18.—After two years the man killed by a bank clerk at Lancaster while burglars were engaged in a midnight raid on the vaults "Pete" Weir, formerly of a small hamlet near Oshawa. His pals, after the shooting, dragged the body to the railway station, and removing their escape and were never recaptured. Some of the gang convicted here of the Toronto Carpet works safe-blowing, were engaged in the robbery with the man shot.

Quebec Cabinet.

Montreal, July 18.—Several charges are impending in the Quebec cabinet. Mr. Weir, the present premier, will be appointed minister of public works, or, if he shortly retires to take a seat on the bench, will be succeeded by August Tassier, M.P.P. for Rimouski, the present minister of agriculture, who will be succeeded by Mr. Al. works, the present minister of public works.

The Trip Cancelled.

The Oddfellows' Relief Association was to have had a trip on the steamship America, this afternoon, but on account of the accident on the New York Central railway, which delayed the Utica excursionists arriving at Clayton to take the America for Kingston, the trip had unfortunately to be cancelled.

World's Fair in 1912.

Berlin, July 18.—It is learned on the highest authority that the government has decided to invite various nations to participate in a great international exposition to be held in 1912. It is proposed that the exhibition shall surpass all the world's fairs.

To Increase The Rates.

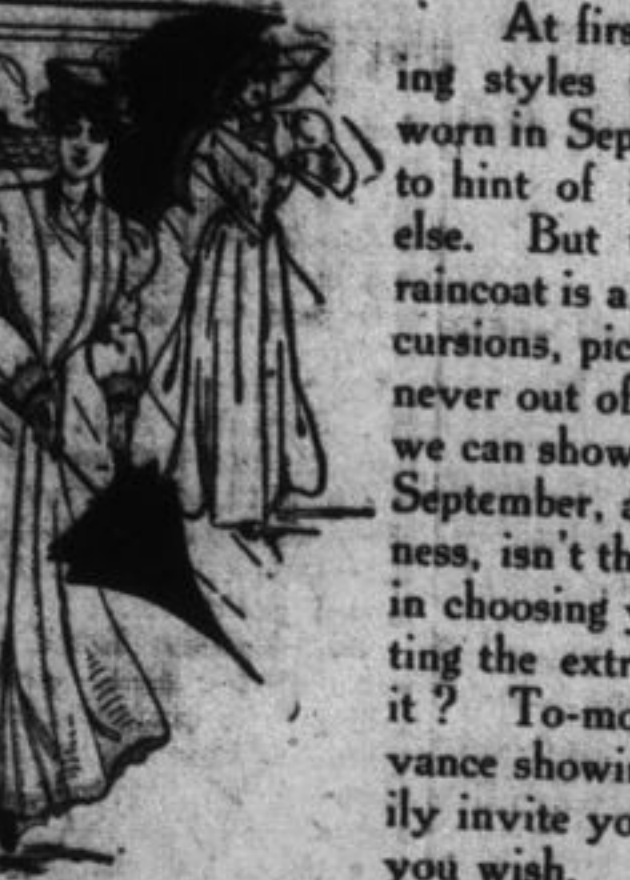
