## ALEXANDER MUIR

### ENCOURAGE PROPOSAL TO HONOR HIS MEMORY.

Committees Will Be Formed at  
 Different Centres to Receive  
 Subscriptions From School  
 Children and Others.

The proposal to do something effective and practical to keep fresh and green the memory of Alexander Muir, the author of "The Maple Leaf," Canada's national anthem, is one that should be encouraged and supported in all parts of the country. In Toronto a public meeting was held, in which glowing tributes were paid to the memory of the dead author, and a proposal favored to make the memorial national in character. Committees will be formed at different centres and subscriptions received from school children and others. Just what character the memorial will assume has not been determined upon, but there are more enduring methods of preserving the record of a man's work and worth than by erecting a monument of bronze or stone. This would tend to preserve the late Mr. Muir's memory in only one or two centres. The expression of devotion and admiration to the deceased patriot and sweet singer should be of a more general character. Some comprehensive plan will doubtless be adopted that will win favor with the contrary Canadians to honor in a worthy way the memory of a man who was beloved by all for his gentle character, lofty spirit and intense patriotism.

Although thousands of copies of his song, "The Maple Leaf," have been sold, Alexander Muir never made one dollar out of its publication. He lived and died a comparatively poor man. He was content to have given Canadians a soulful, stirring, stirring melody that warmed their hearts and quickened their affections for home and country. His verse may not have been perfect, but it was popular and lively. It "caught on," and in the coming years thousands upon thousands more of school children, as well as public-spirited, progressive Canadians, will sing with fervor and enthusiasm more intense of the land of the maple leaf—the fair Dominion of Canada—the best country in the world. All honor to Alexander Muir and all success to the wide movement to preserve and nationalize his memory.

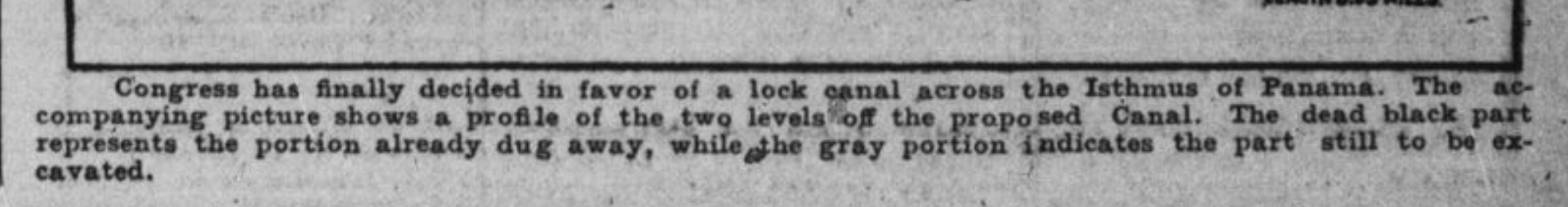
**SENTENCED FOR BIGAMY.**

**VICAR IN READING ROOM.**  
 He Objected to Some of the Literature.  
 A curious situation has arisen between the Rev. J. Campbell McGill, vicar of Isleworth-Thames, Eng., and the local committee which manages the public library there. It means that the vicar, when visiting the reading room, found a periodical named "The Herald of the Cross. In this he read an article containing a passage in which the incident of the washing of the apostles' feet was described as allegorical. After making a marginal comment, "How do you know?" the vicar requested the assistant to remove the publication, which offended him. This the assistant refused to do without the authority of the committee.  
 Thereupon the vicar said it became his duty to do so, and he promptly tore the pamphlet in two and threw it into the fire-place. The affair was duly reported to the local body, and an explanation asked for. In his reply the vicar referred the committee to the historical account of the incident in the Gospel of St. John, declaring

that such views as this article contained were put in a public institution, they would soon have atheism and secularism propagated in like manner, and he left it his duty to protest.
