Almost the Entire Village Fourneaux is Destroyed-So Far Fifteen Are Reported Killed and Many Injured.

New York, July 26.-A cable to the New York Herald, from Turin, dated Tuesday, says that a terrible cloud-burst, in the direction of Mount Cenis tunnel, causing great loss of life and property and interrupting the International railway owing to washouts tains. Almost the entire village of Fourneaux is destroyed, Twenty. houses were completely demolished, and thus far, it has been ascertained, that fifteen persons were killed and sixty injured in the vicinity. The damages are estimated at \$1,000,000. From Modane to Bardonnech the country was ravaged by the storm.

No One So Far Lost. Modane, July 26 .- The reports that fifteen persons were killed as a result of a cloutiburst, yesterday, in th Mont Cenis district are incorrect. 
