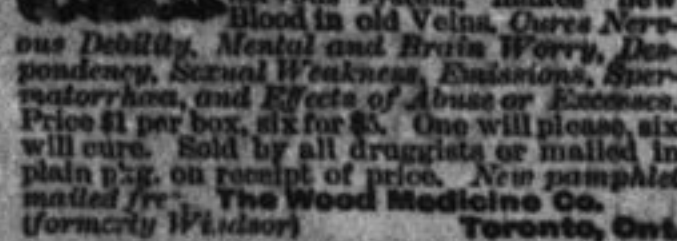

### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

#### That Is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

The crops of the North-West accord us to the government reports for this season, if early harvested and garnered, will far surpass previous years in quality and quantity.

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## ELECTION PROTEST

### ARGUMENT TURNS ON ALLEGED VOTING.

Irishman Wants to Try Election Plans—Criminal Carelessness of Medical Health Officers—Small-boys Allowed to Go Unchecked.

Toronto, July 27.—Justice Treadwell, to-morrow, near the Rainy River election protest, which has passed several phases since the general elections of 1905, when H. W. Kennedy, liberal, was elected.

Mr. Treadwell is the representative of the protest. The main argument, to-morrow, will turn upon alleged voting by aliens.

P. H. O'Neil, of Milltown, Ireland, has entered suit at Osgoode Hall against J. T. Sheppard, Thomas Armstrong, George Turner, and Robert Carter, trustees of a colored people's Baptist church in Windsor for the purpose of violating the man named.

He holds a mortgage for \$5,000 on the church, and payments not being made, he foreclosed. Possession was not given him, hence the suit.

Dr. Bell, secretary of the provincial board of health, who has just returned from Kent county, justifies the Chatham authorities in their complaints regarding the laxity of the health officers of nearby municipalities.

He found that a family with smallpox had been removed from Dresden to Chatham, no one at the latter place knowing that the people had smallpox, and no physician having previously attended the people.

There were several cases of smallpox at Dresden, which had been mistaken for chicken-pox and no attempt was made to call in. As a result the disease was spreading. On orders of Dr. Bell, authorities were taken by the authorities, and it is hoped these will be effective.

## DECLARED A STRIKE.

London, Ont., July 27.—The London street car employees unanimously decided this morning to call a strike this morning to commence immediately.

A strike has been the subject of much talk in the minds of the men for the past few weeks, and they were ready to do so at any time.

The strike was called off by the company and the employees have been made, during the past few weeks, but as Manager King refused to renege the strike was called again.

At eleven o'clock a single car is running on each of the different routes, but very few passengers are being picked up. Everything is very quiet at present.

## INSTANTLY KILL WOMAN.

Husband Also Probably Fatally Injured.

Wynona, Ark., July 27.—Mrs. H. A. Leppert was shot and instantly killed last night, while sitting on the porch of their residence near Cherry Valley.

The shooting was done by three mounted men, who fired from the front gate. At Vandale, five Woodlight brothers, who were on the charge of complicity in the murder. Two years ago, it is said, Mr. Leppert killed a member of the Woodlight family.

## Hanged On An Island.

Crissfield, Md., July 27.—William Lee, the colored youth, sentenced to death in Baltimore three weeks ago for assaulting two women, was hanged by Sheriff Brown, yesterday, on Smith's Island in presence of deputies and witnesses. The hanging was orderly. The mob that had threatened to burn Lee at the stake was outwitted by the sheriff.

## Fatally Injured.

Springfield, Mo., July 27.—Thirty persons were injured, two of them fatally, in a partial wreck of a west-bound St. Louis and San Francisco passenger train last night. The fatally injured are: R. J. Thorp, Monticello, Mo., and Mrs. Kate Shelby.

## Hotel Agents Less Active.

Alexandria, Va., July 27.—According to Village President Cornwall there has been a cessation of soliciting here for the Montreal and Quebec hotels following the putting of a ordinance requiring a license of \$100 for such business.

## Fell Dead From Chair.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., July 27.—Max Goldberg dropped dead with heart disease while sitting in a chair in front of his store here last evening. He was aged forty-five years.

## A SERIOUS FIRE

### WAREHOUSE AND DOCK DESTROYED IN PONTIAC CO.

Fire Supposed to Have Been of Indistinct Origin—No Truth in Rumor That Ten Lives Were Lost.

Ottawa, July 27.—Word has been received of a serious fire at Rapids Des Joachims, Pontiac county. The warehouse of Thomas Marier, merchant, and the dock were destroyed, entailing a loss of \$10,000.

Mr. Marier was away from home when the fire broke out, and Mrs. Marier, an aged nurse, and nine children, who were in the house adjoining the warehouse and dock, escaped in their night clothes. The residence was saved.

The fire is supposed to have been of indistinct origin, and word has been sent to the attorney-general's department at Quebec. An investigation will be made. A rumor that ten lives were lost is not true.

Montreal, July 27.—The unfounded rumor that the loss of ten lives at a fire at Des Joachims, Que., arose out of the destruction of the house of Thomas O'Meara on the 15th inst. No one was burned.

## 1,200 TONS A DAY.

Cunarder Lusitania Greatest Leviathan Afloat.

Cannier's Mammals.

The largest ocean steamship in the world has lately become a familiar phrase. It has been used several times within the past year to designate marine creatures of the period, none of them holding the size distinction long.

In the case, however, of the great Cunard line turbine ship Lusitania, which was launched at the Clydebank yard of John Brown & Co., limited, on June 7th, an advance has been made in size and power—especially in power—which probably keep her at the head of the procession for several years to come, excepting simply her sister ship, the Mauritania, in progress in the yard of Swan, Hunter & Wigham, Richardson, limited, at Newcastle-on-Tyne.

Both ships will be practically alike in bare figures. The Lusitania presents herself thus:

Length 700 feet  
Breadth 88 feet  
Depth (loaded) 80 feet  
Gross tonnage 32,500 tons  
Displacement tonnage 45,000 tons  
Load capacity 37 feet 4 inches  
Height of funnel 155 feet  
Height of funnel 215 feet  
Horsepower 65,000

The largest horsepower afloat up to the present does not much exceed half that of the Lusitania, which latter at a minimum will be 65,000. Since the ship has four separate propellers, each of these will have to absorb, say, 16,250 horsepower. The steam consumption of the Lusitania turbines may probably be taken fairly at fifteen pounds per horsepower per hour. This gives for 65,000 horsepower no less than 437 tons of steam per hour, and probably 300 tons of coal for every 1,200 tons per day of twenty-four hours.

It is not remarkable that the engine and boiler room crews number 400 men.

## Death of Well Known Priest.

Montreal, July 27.—The death is announced of the Rev. A. M. W. Leclair, of the Sulpician Order, and Montreal. He was for many years connected with St. Patrick's and St. Ann's parishes. He was president of the Canadian College at Rome, and was minister of St. Ann's for that period. He was sixty-nine years of age.

## Accused of Theft.

Bellevue, Ont., July 27.—Charged with stealing a ladies' gold watch and two bottles of gin and two boxes of cigars from the Victoria Hotel, Frederick Renlow was arrested last evening. It is alleged he tried to hang himself with the watch and chain in the police cells during the night. He sold the watch and chain to a farmer for \$2.

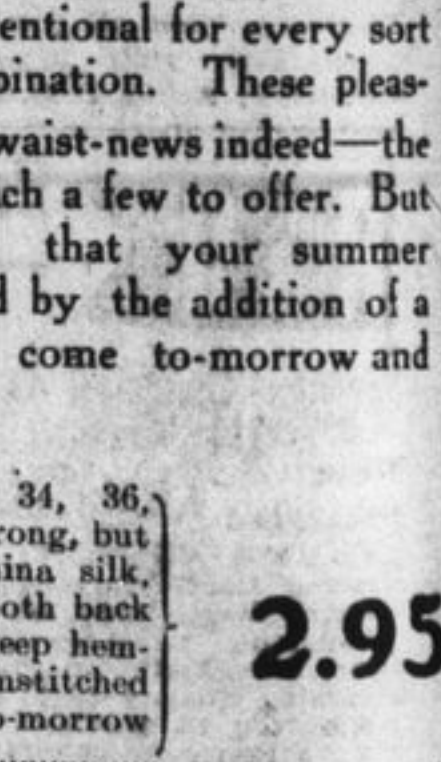
