CABLE TO WOLFE ISLAND.

Bell Company Begins Work at Cape Vincent.

Watertown, N.Y. Standard.

The Central Telephone and Telegraph company began on Tuesday placing a cable from Cape Vincent to Wolfe Island. The cable is one of the largest that the company has ever handled, and is about a mile in length, weighing eighteen tons. The cable contains ten pairs of wires, and is two inches in diameter by about six inches in circumference. It was made by the Western Electric company of New York, and Robert W. Gillespie, is at the Cape superintending the laying of the cable.

The cable went through Monday on a large flat tug, and after it was delivered at the Cape station it took nearly a day to get it in position to be paid out into the river. The cable was placed on a large pontoon, which is sent slowly by a tug, and is doubtless now in position.

When the cable is placed at Wolfe Island, it will be connected with the Canadian Telephone company, and will make possible direct communication with Kingston from this side. The Canadian company will begin making their connections at once.

Direct telephone communication between Cape Vincent and Kingston has been desired by the people residing in both places, and heretofore it has been a difficult matter for a person at either point to talk to a person in the other place. The cable has been sent either to Buffalo or to Ogdensburg, and then repeated from Prescott or some Canadian point near Buffalo, making two connections necessary and a delay that was almost unavoidable in either case. The rate was very high, too, when a message had to be sent in that way.

**NEWS OF CHURCHES**

**THE RELIGIOUS DOINGS IN THE VARIOUS WORLD.**

To Help Replace Sunday School Libraries—Lunenburg, N.S. Church Received Beautiful Gifts—The Ruy Chinnamen.

Rev. J. W. Kirkpatrick has been appointed steward of Woodstock College.

Rev. A. S. Ross, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Westboro, Ont., has accepted a call to Montreal west.

Rev. Andrew Murray, Wellington, South Africa, has retired from the ministry owing to age and failing health.

Rev. T. M. Fothergill, Ph.D., has resigned his pastorate at Whitty and Brooklin, and will shortly remove to Toronto.

Bristol cathedral took 582 years before it was completed in 1888. Gloucester cathedral was 425 years in building.

Rev. A. F. Cobb has resigned the Baptist pastorate at Fort Elgin, and expects to go to the west about August 15th.

The cathedral at Trondhjem, in which the king and queen of Norway were crowned, June 22nd, is six hundred years old.

It is claimed that a Christian church existed at Glastonbury, as early as A.D. 390. St. Martin's, Canterbury, was built about A.D. 397.

Rev. W. A. Bremner, pastor of the Presbyterian church, Bracebridge, has received a unanimous call from the congregation of Ripley and Bertha.

Rev. P. C. Parker, M.A., for number of years pastor of First avenue church, Toronto, has tendered his resignation of Logan avenue church, Winnipeg.

Rev. E. H. Emmett, formerly of Brockville, Ont., has removed from High Grove to South Pasadena, Cal. He has become Baptist state evangelist for Southern California.

The congregation of Indian Lands, presbytery of Glangarry, decided at a meeting held in the Gordon church, on July 5th, to extend a hearty and unanimous call to Rev. A. Mackenzie, D.D., Douglas.

Rev. Alfred W. Stone, a graduate of Toronto Baptist College, and for many years pastor in Cleveland, Ohio, has resigned his pastorate of Glenville Baptist church.

Preparations for the World's Christian Endeavor convention at Geneva, Switzerland, are proceeding rapidly, and the convention promises to be one of the most important in the history of the movement.

The Presbyterian congregations of Deacon and Metz have extended an unanimous call to Rev. James McCrea. The stipend is \$800, with manse and two weeks' vacation. A new church is in course of erection at Metz.

Rev. S. D. Nixon, Stanley street Presbyterian church, Ayr, Ont., has resigned his pastorate. There is a call under way from Red Deer, Alberta.

Mr. Nixon will go west as soon as he is free from his church duties.

The Rev. Malcolm Peart, B.A., late of Grand View, Man., who went home to London, Eng., for special treatment for his throat, is not the curial rule. Christ church, Highbury, London, N. Mr. Peart hopes to be able to return to a Baptist church next year.

A Baptist clergyman in Indianapolis, Rev. L. D. Bass, is reporting that at the time has come, especially among Baptists, when "we should cease to worship that Baptist gold brick, Rockefeller, and turn our attention more to the poor carpenter of Nazareth."

Gipsy Smith is to sail for America on the Caronia, on September 25th. He will conduct missions in the United States all through the winter, returning to England in February. It has been arranged that no hall used for his missions is to hold less than two thousand persons.

The Chairman of Moosejaw, Sask., are taking a deep interest in the Y.M.C.A. building fund, and what is more, they are contributing to it. Yip Foo and Grand Wing have contributed \$100 and \$25 respectively, and another named Wing Yet, \$10. All three are restaurant-keepers. Yip Foo is a member of the Methodist church.

The American Tract Society has voted a grant of three thousand dollars worth of publications wherewith to aid in replacing the Sunday school libraries which were destroyed in the various churches of San Francisco that were consumed by fire. The work of selecting the volumes which will be sent has already begun, and they will be shipped to the Pacific coast.

St. John's Anglican church at Lunenburg, N.S., has been the recipient of many beautiful gifts in the past from devoted members of the congregation, among whom may be mentioned as one of the foremost, Lieut. Col. Kaubach, who three years ago presented the splendid chime of ten bells. Once more Col. Kaubach has helped to beautify this second oldest sacred edifice of the dominion by the presentation of three elegantly carved oak clergy stalls.

Rev. S. M. A very sensible and serviceable summer coat for the small toddler is that of some washable fabric like white linen or pique made on loose lines, that the garments may be easily slipped on over the chubby lingerie frock of elaborate muslin, and giving the necessary protection without too much additional weight. Pique is the favorite material for this purpose. It lunders well, does not muss as readily as linen and may be made up after almost any pattern along simple lines. The designer of this small garment has borrowed her idea from the grown-ups' pony neck of the present season, varying the cut a trifle so as to add more fullness to the body portion. **AN ODD MEETING.**

The Attendants Have No Use For Babies.

Forest City, Ia., July 26.—If the few dozen old bachelors and old maids who met here, to-day, in convention, in accordance with the call issued by Clinton Merrick, chairman of the old bachelors' committee, had the deciding voice, very few, if any, babies would be born in this country. The convention is one of the oddest conglomeration that ever came together in one place. Most of the members of the convention are really old bachelors and old maids, with all the peculiar and freakish notions which many years of celibacy are apt to develop in individuals. Some of those present are not quite so pronounced and radical in their views and notions and have probably been attracted more by curiosity and the cheap excursion rates of the railroads than by the desire to assist in launching the movement to launch. At the opening of the convention Clinton Merrick, who is the leading spirit and head of the meeting, welcomed the bachelors and old maids present and delivered an address, in which he explained the theories in support of which the convention has been called. He attacked the theory of race suicide as interpreted by President Roosevelt, and maintained that race suicide really did not consist in the birth of too few, but in the birth of too many children. He entered into a lengthy discussion of the question and was enthusiastically applauded by the meeting.

There was some disappointment that President Roosevelt had not accepted the challenge of the committee to debate the race suicide question with the old maids and bachelors. The meeting intends to form a permanent organization and to nominate a complete state ticket on a platform advocating race suicide as condemned by President Roosevelt.

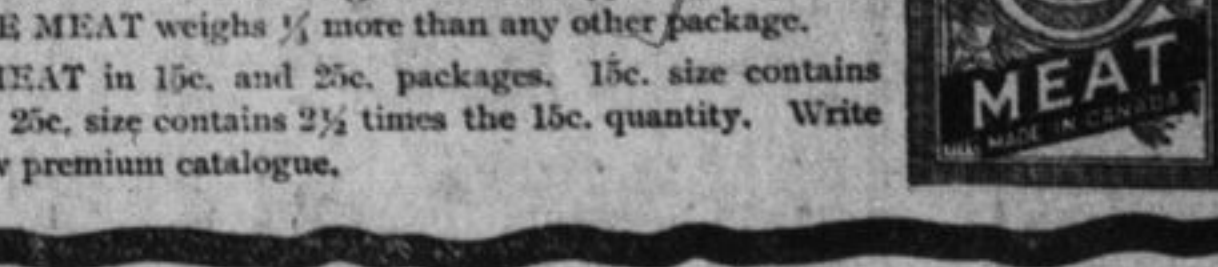

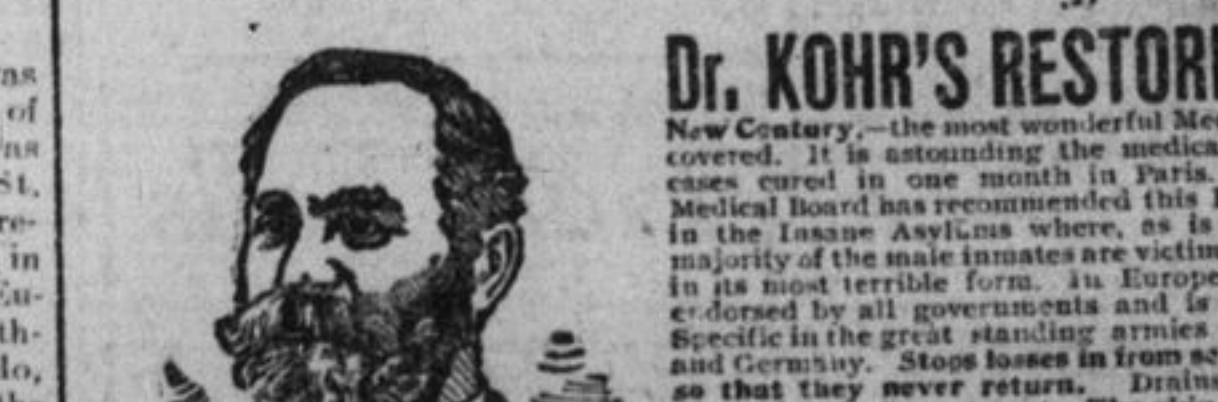
