Troubles About Patronage.

There is some confusion about the attitude of the Whitney government towards its friends and foes. This paper has it that a constituency which is represented by a liberal has no right to expect favours from the government. It has no right to expect common justice. This is contrary, it is true, to the Whitney philosophy as it has been preached or handed out in epistolary form.

The great man who now reigns as premier lifted his voice in an emphatic way, while in Kingston, and declared that though he would like the city to send him a supporter, the government which he represented would do fairly by it at all times and under all circumstances. These anti-election pledges have been put in in pickle, and for use as the occasion may require. It is not admitted meanwhile, though the promise with regard to the normal school has been broken, that Mr. Whitney has changed his mind, and that because criticism predominates here the people shall be punished with all the vindictiveness that a jaundiced party can display.

But there is another side to the case. It is presented by Lindsay, who is the county seat of a constituency that has ever been faithful to the conservative party. For four parliaments its member has held the fort, and when normal schools were being given away, as marks of government favour, Mr. Fox, M.P.P., thought he had a claim to special recognition. He was passed over, and the school, (or bribe) given to Peterboro, which is represented now, for the first time in many years, by a conservative, and may not again give evidence of a similar political weakness. Does it pay to be represented by a member? asks the Lindsay Watchman-Warder, the conservative party paper, and the answer is in the negative.

Thus there is a difference of opinion upon the patronage question, and nothing that is apt to occur will end the inharmonious that now prevails.

Rule In The Transvaal.

The Bannerman government is doing things and one of its propositions—to give self-government to the Transvaal—is exciting large attention. Indeed upon conditions of this proposition depend the reopening of the whole South African issue. The imperial government is influenced by the conviction that it cannot legislate locally for a people so far away, and its measure of self-government is, apparently such as can be given to any colony without involving the supremacy which Britain, at large sacrifices, struggled to maintain.

There is a party in British politics which sees in the self-government proposal the abandonment of all the advantages which were reaped from the war. They call themselves "Progressives." They see mischief ahead in any concession to the people of the Transvaal (and the colonies) remember that the government of the Transvaal under Kruger enjoyed all the power it could desire, in the direction of local affairs, and it defied the mother country, repudiated its sovereignty, and forced the cruel war which cost thousands of lives and millions of money.

There is a danger of trouble from the Orange Free State, in which the European population is very light, and the leadership of the races of a treacherous kind. Whatever the imperial government may do for the Transvaal it will be certain, if it heeds the warnings of competent witnesses, not to offer any freedom to those who will misuse it. The situation is the more-critical and complex because of the appeal which has been made to the colonists, including the Canadians, and because they must be interested in the permanent peace of the country they helped to subdue. The "Progressives"—who are not acting with ordinary calmness—would have the colonists believe that their work is going for nothing. Were this true it would be appalling. It would have an injurious effect on the political spirit of the people. But it will be best for the Canadians to know more about the subject, to understand it completely, before undertaking to pass upon it.

The Mail virtually throws up the sponge in the Murphy mining case. Had the transaction been carried through in a hole and corner way, there would have been a scandal, it admits. It is because the deal was private that there is a row, and a reputation for the Ottawa Citizen, a well-known conservative paper.

Editorial Notes.

The Ottawa Citizen is now the independent paper in Ottawa. Its condemnation of the local government in the Temiskaming mining deal is a revelation.

The Chicago council is removing the bill boards from within certain limits of the city. The poster business has a certain advertising value, but it is not what some people think it is.

The Old Boys who came from Toronto seemed to feel the presence they could not see. The spirit of J. B. McKay will long be manifested in the works to which he lent his hand.

Thomas Murray wants to go to parliament as the representative of North Renfrew without regard to politics. He expects the support of the conservatives. On what ground, pray?

Russell Sage left most of his money to Mrs. Sage, who helped him to economize and save. Well, she can do what she likes with it, and we'll see what a woman can do with a barrel of money.

Kingston is assured that if it will be contrary to the local representation question it must accept the consequences so far as the Whitney government is concerned. That is another threat which will be remembered.

Sir William Van Horn predicts that there will be a crisis in the affairs of Canada unless there is a larger importation of labour. The country, he says, is suffering for the want of men who are willing to work and so contribute to its development.

The Toronto Telegram says the Whitney government is encouraging the development of its ministers. One thought it was encouraging the development of its commissioners, and it will repeat its experiment in view of the Murphy experience.

Hon. G. W. Ross rejoices in that the provincial railway is prospering, and that new Ontario is opening up, and with good reason. But for the Ross party there would not have been a government railway and the riches of Cobalt would have been undiscovered.

ENGINEER-KILLED.

Scene One Had Tampered With the Switch.

Montreal, July 31.—A fast freight, west bound, on the C.P.R., ran into a siding at St. Rose, last night, and struck a number of loaded cars standing there, as the result of which James Brown, the engineer, was killed and Fireman Dixie, was injured. Eight cars were demolished by the force of the crash. Some of the cars on the siding contained cheese and other lumber. The accident is attributed to an unplaced switch, but Station Agent Dumouchel declares that when he last handled the switch it was set right.
