In 1820, her family removed to Kingston, Upper Canada, where two years later married George Henry Hart, a bookbinder. Two years after publishing her first book she left Kingston, and followed her husband to the United States. In 1821 she published a second book, "Tomewante, or the Adopted Son of America."
