Believing in doing things himself, Mayor Burke does not leave his political fortunes in the hands of lieutenants.

He is a firm advocate of the house-to-house, hand-to-hand, canvass.

The sturdy mayor came to his trade by inheritance, he got into politics by accident.

Now a few years past fifty, Mr. Burke has the appearance of a man a little over forty.

Time does not hang heavily upon the blacksmith mayor's hands.

Callers begin to come early, and he talks informally to them while he keeps at work.

Frequently he lays aside his leather apron, rolls down his sleeves, puts on his coat and hat and walks a block to the executive office in the City hall.

After lunching with his family at one o'clock, he spends an hour at his office, where he usually receives a number of callers.

When he first asked the voters to elect him mayor four years ago, he promised certain reforms.

That the voters of Burlington like this kind of an executive is evidenced by the fact that Mayor Burke is now serving his fourth term.

Each success at the polls, however, was only after a sensational and bruising fight in which every effort was put forth by his opponent to bring about his defeat.

Politics is a passion with Burke. He has been in the arena for at least

twenty-five years, closely watching the progress of events, "bitting in," as he expresses it, whenever he sees a good chance to offer advice.

His policy as head of the Burlington city government is epitomized in the following extracts from his messages to the board of aldermen, after having served with credit on various appointive commissions.

His record as a member of the board of aldermen was one continuous fight for his ideas.

He secured a municipal electric plant, and he is after a city gas plant.

After working much of the day in his shop on one of the principal streets, Mr. Burke goes in the evening to his pleasant home on North Union street.

All the mayor's nine children are living. Mrs. Burke is an accomplished woman, who takes a deep interest in her husband's welfare and plans, feeling proud of his success.

She is retiring, however, and seldom appears at public functions, preferring to remain at home and attend to her domestic duties.

Mr. Burke is strong with the laboring classes, and these have proved of valuable assistance in his municipal contests.

A worker with his hands himself since early youth, Mr. Burke is in deep sympathy with the toiling masses whose brows ache so materially to the prosperity and resources of the country.

One of a family of ten children, Mr. Burke early in life was compelled to assist in the support of the household.

During his first years as mayor some of his critics were inclined to smile at Mr. Burke's efforts at speech-making.
