TERRIBLE DISASTER

Italian Steamer Wrecked Off Spanish Coast on Saturday Night. Over Three Hundred Persons Were Drowned and Five Hundred Saved—The Captain Blamed Himself and Went Down With the Boat—Italians With Brutality and With Knives Fought for the Life Boys and Boats, and Let Women and Children Perish.

Cartagena, Aug. 6.—The Italian steamer Siroco, from Genoa and Barcelona to Buenos Ayres, was wrecked off Hormigas Island, off Cape Palos, Spain, on Saturday evening, and, according to the latest figures, 395 persons are drowned or missing and 545 saved.

At five o'clock, on Saturday afternoon, the ill-fated ship was off Bajos Hormigas, near Cape Palos. Here navigation is difficult, owing to the number of rocks that are hidden at high tide. The captain ventured too near Hormigas shoal, with the view of saving time, but whatever its cause, the disaster was sudden and complete.

The fate of the vessel was apparent at once, and the wildest panic supervened, in which terrible scenes were enacted. Many persons were killed in fights to obtain life belts and to get into the small boats. The Siroco quickly capsized, and the water was so high that the fishermen along the coast sought to render every possible assistance, and sent out boats which brought many survivors ashore.

The captain of the Siroco attributed the wreck to his own imprudence and personally went down with his vessel. The Austrian consul at Rio de Janeiro was among the saved, but he lost a large amount of money when the vessel went down.

One Of The Worst On Record. London, Aug. 6.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Telegraph describes the Siroco disaster as one of the worst on record. The Italian emigrants, with knives in their hands and without regard for women or children, fought with the greatest brutality for the possession of life-boats and boats and for half an hour were masters of the situation.

A Bishop Drowned. The Bishop of San Paulo, Brazil, went down with the vessel while rescuing the drowning passengers. The Archbishop of San Paulo was saved. It is reported that the celebrated Spanish singer, Lola Milanese, was among the drowned.

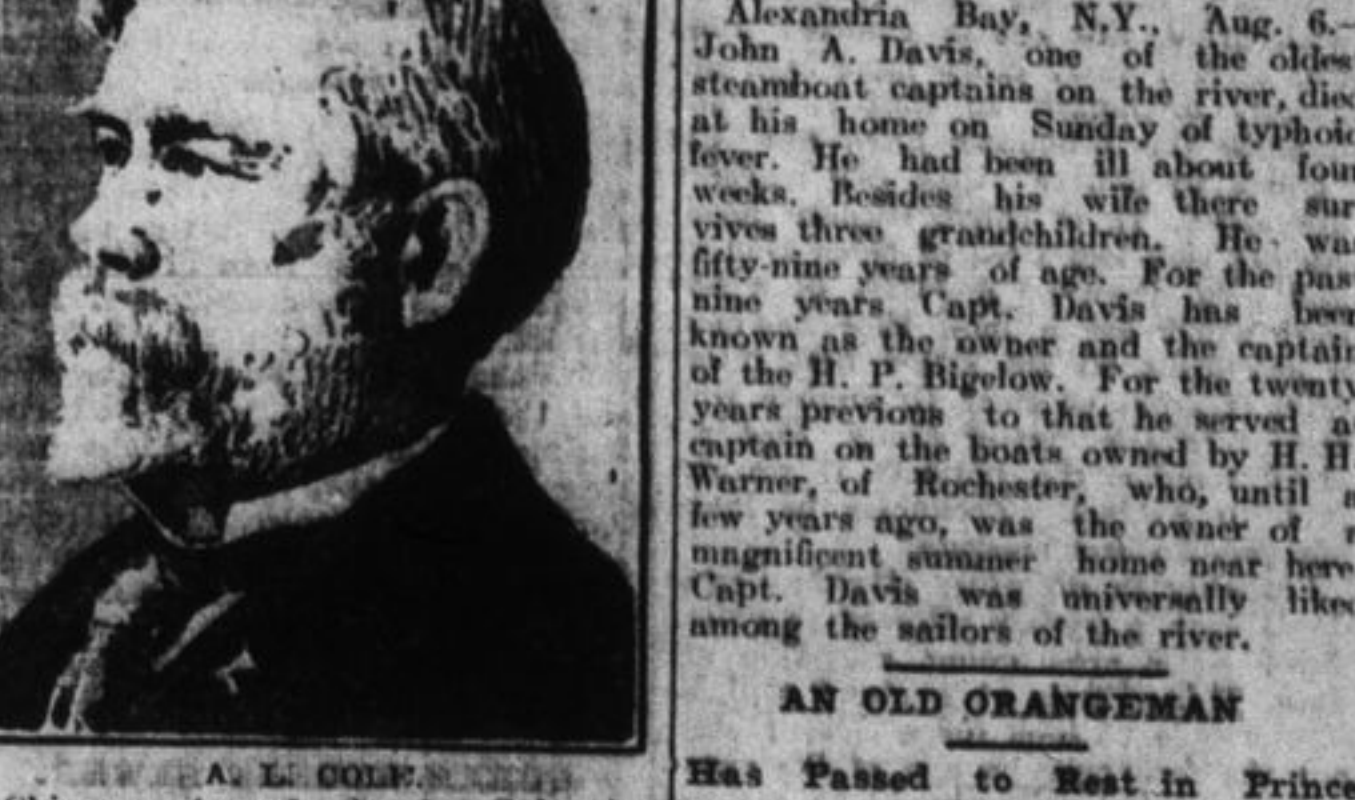

ANTI-FRENCH IN MOROCCO

Rapid Spread of Violent Agitation—Rebels Concentrating. London, Aug. 6.—A despatch from Tangier, says: "Highly sensational reports are being received here, causing the utmost excitement. Daily, almost hourly, comes information from the interior of the rapid spread of a violent anti-French agitation. The rebels are concentrating their military contingents around Marakesh (Morocco City), the southern capital, and there is no doubt that a formidable coalition of semi-independent vassals has been formed. They are clamoring for a holy war, and urging the viceroy, Prince Abdul Hafid, to proclaim himself sultan. The situation is more critical than it has been for thirty years."
