MR. SAGE'S SHIELD

LAWLAW TO BE REMEMBERED BY HEIRS.

Plan is to Raise Sufficient Money to Provide Him With an Annual Income of \$1,500—A Wreck, Incapable of Physical Exertion.

New York, Aug. 8.—It is probable that on or before September 21st, the will of the late Mr. Sage, who is satisfied with the bequest of \$25,000, will call upon each of the other nephews and nieces to contribute to a fund of \$10,000 to be presented to William H. Lawlaw, the "human shield," who saved Mr. Sage's life fifteen years ago. This heir, whose identity has not been revealed, suggested that a round robin be addressed to Mr. Sage asking that sufficient part of the estate to yield a yearly income of \$1,500 be set aside for Lawlaw's benefit. That would mean a principal of \$30,000 invested at five per cent. It is believed Mr. Sage always has had strong sympathy for the nephew who is indirectly the means of adding fifteen years to her husband's life. The event of refusal by Mrs. Sage, which is regarded as remote, at twenty-five years will be asked to contribute \$400 each to make up a fund of \$10,000.

Lawlaw is a wreck, incapable of physical exertion without assistance. He lives with his two sisters in a little flat at Ninety-second street and Broadway. In clear weather he is able to walk, leaning on the arm of a Ninetieth street, where he meets a few old friends and chats with them for an hour, and then is assisted back to his home.

He has a hundred and seventy-four scars in his back—evidence of that many wounds received by him when the crank Norcross dropped the bomb which he intended to kill Russell Sage. Seventy of those wounds affected superficial muscles between the neck and the hips.

BRONZE STATUE

To Lord Dufferin Unveiled at Belfast.

The bronze statue of the late Lord Dufferin was unveiled by the Marquis of Londonderry in the presence of a large gathering in the grounds of the new City Hall, at Belfast. The memorial is in the Italian Renaissance style, freely treated to conform to modern requirements. The pedestal is of brown Portland stone, to harmonize with the material of which the City Hall is built, and on it are bronze figures representing Canada and India, over both of which Lord Dufferin acted as Governor-General. On the pedestal is a figure of the late nobleman, eight feet in height, in the robes of the Order of St. Patrick. Surmounting the figure is a handsome canopy, supported by Ionic pillars, and over all is a figure of Fame, while around the base are carved the names of the many cities in which Lord Dufferin upheld the interests and dignity of the empire as Ambassador. The height of the memorial is 35 feet, and its cost £5,400. Lord Dufferin was a modest, but faithful, churchman.
