COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

C.P.R. land sales for the year, to June 30th, totalled 981,500 acres, for \$2,990,000.

The canoe shipments from Montreal from May 1st to August 4th were 1,084,500 boxes; same time in 1900, 1,040,488 boxes; in 1904, 813,028.

The present market values (this year's wheat crop in Ontario) are about 200,000,000 bushels, worth about \$42,000,000.

The Ontario Mining Development company, which was organized in Sydney, with a capitalization of \$500,000 has been awarded its search for ore at Whytecombe by the holding of a title deed of homestead at Logan's Glen, in the north side of Whytecombe.

The copper mine at Eldorado, which is owned and operated by the Madras Gold Mining Company of Syracuse, N.Y., is giving satisfactory results. The shaft is down to a depth of 230 feet, and the vein is 15 feet wide, mostly hematite, and is estimated to contain 200,000 tons of ore.

The silver district adjacent to Port Arthur, Ont., has been awarded for 1904, is to be reopened, and in the course of a few months mining camps that employed hundreds of men will again be in full operation. Silver Mountain, Bancroft, and other properties have been increased by a syndicate of American capitalists, and thousands of dollars will be expended in machinery and development.

The Hanson mines are again to be opened with an entire new and modern equipment by a company which is being formed in New York to develop them. A thousand or more men are to be employed, and the Carthage & Adirondack railroad was built, may be the cause of extensive operations like those in Michigan where mountains of iron ore are being mined.

A Quiet Circus Day.

The police report yesterday to have been one of the quietest circus days ever. There were no cases of pocket picking reported except those on the incoming K. & P. train, which, however, the conductor denies. The crowd at the grounds were quite orderly both afternoon and evening.

CZAR SEEKS HELP

GOVERNMENT TO SETTLE AGRARIAN QUESTION.

Will Give Lead to Poor—Hopes to Introduce By This Means Appeal for Property—Then to Country.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 5.—The real intention of the government when it dissolved the lower house of parliament, as revealed by a member of the cabinet, to the Associated Press, shows that Premier Stolypin at least intends to pursue and hold to an affirmative policy, amounting virtually to a determination on the part of the administration to settle the agrarian question according to its own lights and perspective of parliament, and then to appeal to the country upon this issue.

The government expects to rally not only all the landed interests but the mass of the peasantry to its side by actually giving the latter some immediate relief instead of merely holding out hopes of a more advantageous settlement in the indefinite future, which has been the stock in trade of many reformers.

But above all, individual members of the government calculate, will lack of which has made many peasants such easy converts to the theory of the nationalistic land.

A despatch from Poltava describes the destruction of an estate owned by Prince Kotchubev, where a breeding stud of 200 horses and more than 600 sheep were locked in burning buildings and left to rot.

Director Sturoroff, of the large printing establishment attached to the official Messenger, where the composers struck Monday, has been discharged, and the minister of railways has demanded the resignation of Superintendent Laurence, of the Ironclad railway for permitting strikers to interfere with traffic on his road.

That there is continued preparation among the revolutionaries for an armed uprising in the south, is believed to be indicated by the interception by the police of shipments of arms and ammunition, including rifles and sabres, at Polesva and Theodosia.

ANTIDOTE FOR GRAY HAIR.

Gray hairs are an indication that the hair-producing organs are weak. When found they should be cut down to the healthy part, and the head should be exposed as much as possible, except in the middle of the day, to the sun and air. Massage the scalp at the same time with the cushion tips of your fingers. Brush hair and scalp at night with a coarse, stiff brush until a glow is produced, and rub in a little lotion composed of two drachms each of borax and glycerine to eight ounces of distilled water.

This is cooling and allays dryness of the skin. Brush again in the morning, and to the roots of the hair apply with a brush this tonic: Tincture of squaridone, one ounce; liquid ammonia, one drachm; glycerine, one-half ounce; oil of thyme, one-half drachm; oil of rosemary, one-half drachm. Rub all together with six ounces of rosewater. It must be rubbed in well with the finger tips. Do not use oils of any kind on the hair.

Wray, arrested here, yesterday, on the charge of seducing \$125,000 from the Union Trust Bank company, Pittsburg, was arraigned in the police court this morning, on a nominal charge of vagrancy.
