A NEW STEAMER

WILL BE BUILT IN KINGSTON NEXT WINTER.

Capt. Roys Says He is Well Backed With Finances and a Craft of Fine Dimensions Will Be the Results.

Capt. Roys of the steamer Aletha, while his boat lay at Napanee, came down to the city, to-day, on business connected with the new 840,000 steamer which he, backed by United States capital, intends to build this winter, to go into the river excursion business next season.

"Yes," said the captain in talking to the Whig, to-day, "it is so well settled that its going through is an assured thing."

"Will she be built in Kingston?" queried the reporter.

"I think I can state that the Kingston foundry will be the builders," he replied.

The captain was not ready to make public the names of his backers, but stated that perhaps he would have more to say, in a week or two.

It is planned to run this new steamer in connection with the Aletha for next summer, but for 1908 she will likely be put on a regular route.

Plans for this new boat have been made by a local man. A description of the new steamer was first given exclusively in the Whig several weeks ago.

Capt. Roys returned to Napanee at noon to join his boat, and he goes to Belleville, out of which city he takes a moonlight this evening.

BISHOP NAMED BY POPE. Will Look After Catholic Poles in United States.

Toledo, Aug. 9.—Announcement is made that Right Rev. Joseph Weber, of Lemberg, has been appointed by the pope as bishop for the United States to look after the welfare of the three million Poles in America. Bishop Weber is now in Rome making a novitiate. As soon as this is completed he will come to America and make his headquarters at St. Stanislaus. The bishop is a Pole, a director of sacred theology and a noted linguist.

Demand An Agreement. Toronto, Aug. 9.—This morning's roll call showed that 1,100 Toronto carpenters had obeyed yesterday's strike order. Some bosses are offering thirty-five cents and forty cents an hour, but the men say they are determined to have a written agreement with the Builders' Exchange notwithstanding individual employers and will hold out until they get such an agreement.

Ottawa, Aug. 9.—Thomas Ahearn states that if the government gives its endorsement to the scheme for the establishment of an ordnance factory the company having the matter in hand will make a million-dollar outlay immediately and further expenditures later. Ten acres are required for the site, and the town of Prescott is anxious to furnish it.

A CANADIAN AT OXFORD.

W. L. Grant to Lecture on Colonial History.

Toronto Globe. A young Canadian who has just been elevated to an important place in the British educational world was in the city, Tuesday, in the person of W. L. Grant, son of the late Principal Grant, of Queen's University. Mr. Grant's success in the old land has earned him the appointment of lecturer in colonial history at Oxford University, a department recently founded by the late Alfred Beit, the South African magnate, who lately died. The branch was originally planned for seven years, but by his will Mr. Beit made it permanent. Mr. Grant will spend a few weeks in Michigan and Toronto before returning on September 15th to undertake his new work.

Mr. Grant studied at Queen's before taking his graduation course at Oxford and since then has filled positions as teacher at Upper Canada and St. Andrew's Colleges in this city. Latterly, he studied for a year in Paris, and some months ago he was engaged in London preparing a number of Canadian articles for the new edition of the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

Mr. Grant said that the first subject to be taken up in the new department in which he will be lecturer, will be the development of the Canadian constitution from 1763 to 1867, and a number of his books to be specially studied will be Johnston's "Constitutional Documents." The department will also have a professor, H. E. Everett, an Englishman, having been appointed to that position.

DID NOT KNOW HIM. O'Connor Not Recognized By Prison Officials.

A penitentiary authority visited the police station, this afternoon, to make an identification of O'Connor. "I do not ever remember having seen him before," he declared, after a moment's reflection.

It had been, at first thought, at the penal institution, in Portmouth, that O'Connor was an ex-convict, whose name, who was caught, yesterday, he had tobacco in his possession, as though he intended giving it to some of the convicts working at the quarry.

O'Connor is a tall, slim man, of perhaps twenty-six years of age. He is sandy-complexioned, and clean shaven. On his left cheek he bears a faint, slightly raised scar, which there is an impediment in his speech. He still wears his khaki uniform.
