THE GRAND DUKE ATTACKED BY GUARDS.

And Narrowly Escaped Assassination—A Peaceful Mutiny in the Part of the Soldiers—Refuse to Shoot on Peasants.



GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS.
St. Petersburg, Aug. 11.—Grand Duke Nicholas Nikolaevich, president of the council of national defence, narrowly escaped assassination, yesterday afternoon, at the hands of the imperial guards, in the guard camp at Krasnoye.

The appeal of the members of the former duma to the soldiers not to fire on their brothers, the peasants, has brought fruit in the shape of a peaceful mutiny on the part of 2,000 soldiers, who have notified their officers that it will be useless for them to give orders to shoot the peasants they have been sent to subdue.

THE VERY LATEST CALLED FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD.

TWO GERMAN LIVE ON NOTHING PER DAY.

Secret of Economy and the Simple Life is Saved at Last—Man's Original Food.

London, Aug. 11.—Two German professors have solved the problem of how to live on "nothing a day." They are at present leading an experimentally simple existence in Kabokan, a small island in the Bismark archipelago, in the South Seas, where their food consists only of coconuts, their clothes of lion cloths and their amusements of sitting in the sea reading or watching native dancers.

The discovery of how to live on nothing was made by Prof. Engelhardt, of Munich and Erlangen Universities. He suffered from ill-health from his childhood, and nine years ago he started experimenting with a fruit diet.

He was soon convinced that the fruits obtainable in Europe were not most suitable, and in 1901 he left for Ceylon, and after experimenting there and in the South Seas, he has come to the conclusion that the coconut is the original, and therefore the most suitable, food of man.

The professor was joined, fifteen months ago, by Dr. A. Rothmann, and the two are now living on coconuts at a cost of nothing per day.

H. M. Robson, of Gowan terrace, Newcastle-on-Tyne, who has just returned from London after a pleasure trip to Kabokan, gives an interesting account of the professors' simple life.

"I went out by the German-Lloyd boat for a holiday. The trip lasted seventeen weeks, and cost less than \$200," he said. "I found both the professors in very good health. I adopted the coconut diet myself, and found it agreed with me excellently. The coconuts are quite different from those seen in the country. They are fresh and soft, and are eaten with a spoon, like butter. The nut if full of a fresh milk, and that is the only drink used."

"The island is a land of perpetual spring. It is thickly covered with vegetation, is only two miles long and one broad, and is an ideal place to take a trip to," concluded Mr. Robson, strongly advising anyone who can spare the time to go. Visitors will be warmly welcomed by the professors, and the only expense will be the passage money, for living there costs nothing."
