Canada Makes A Change.

WHERE MEN STAY AWAY.

Preacher's Reasons For Non-Church Attendance.

Men are absent from church for many reasons, any one of which if agreed was sufficient to keep almost any man away from the church portals, were advanced by Rev. D. H. Glass, pastor of Haven Methodist Episcopal church, in his sermon on "Why Men Don't Go to Church."

He gave the results of an investigation which he has been conducting on this line to those who attend the Y.M.C.A. Sunday afternoon.

"Men have been deceived in business transactions by church members of high standing; therefore, suspicious of all men who claim membership in the church, they stay away from places where they must associate with those men," said Rev. Mr. Glass.

Statement made a good many men in the audience, but his heads affirmatively. Then he went on outlining the topics of his sermon:

"Men are disgusted with ministers for many reasons. There is a lack of manliness in and about them; they argue, ministers and the gospel they preach are too effeminate. Ministers appear more like women than men to them. Ministers sacrifice truth to rhetorical effect in delivering funeral sermons. Men are afraid of the clerical coat and white tie."

"Then, the church often fails to interest men. Its music sometimes stirs up the animal instead of the spiritual in men. It often appears to them that the church doesn't care much whether or not it interests men."

Rev. Glass said he proposed spending his vacation in getting acquainted with the men in his congregation with a view of inducing them to attend church more regularly.

WHERE ENGLAND LEADS.

She Punishes Her Criminals, High and Low.

There are few things in which England is qualified to be a pattern to the United States, but in one respect, at least, it is immeasurably superior to this country. It punishes its criminals. Great America does not.

One of the most famous instances of the unswerving British determination to enforce the laws against crime is the case of Earl Ferrers. This man not only possessed an honorable title, but was wealthy. In a fit of anger he shot and killed one of his servants.

When arraigned at the bar of justice he claimed the ancient right of an English nobleman to be tried by his peers in the House of Lords. It was granted. The lord chancellor of the British empire presided at the trial, and the jury was the House of Lords, many of the members personal friends of the accused and some of them relatives.

Earl Ferrers was found guilty and sentenced to be hanged. Two weeks later he expiated his crime on the gallows.
