KING'S TRIPS
To Visit Spain in The Autumn.
A NAVAL ALLIANCE
PROPOSED BETWEEN ENGLAND AND SPAIN.

Would Be Highly Regarded by the Spanish, Who Would Be Ready to Give England the Usufruct of Her Splendid Ports in Certain Eventualities.
Madrid, August 14.—It is understood King Edward and Queen Alexandra will make a state visit to Spain in the autumn. The feeling is growing here that an extension of the entente with France and England, over the Algerian conference, into a naval alliance with England would be infinitely valuable to Spanish national life. The idea is regarded with great satisfaction in Spain, which is ready to give England the usufruct of her splendid ports in certain eventualities.

To See Austria's Emperor.
Vienna, Aug. 14.—It is semi-officially stated that King Edward when he leaves Marlborough will be the guest of Emperor Franz Joseph at the Schœnbrunn Palace, September 9th, and that he will start on his journey for England the following day.

HENRY CARSCALEN IS ILL.
Is Suffering From Acute Bright's Disease.
Hamilton, Ont., Aug. 14.—Henry Carscalen, K.C., M.P.P., chairman of the private bills committee of the Ontario legislature, and member for East Hamilton, lies at the point of death at his residence here. Acute Bright's disease is the trouble. For some time Mr. Carscalen has not been in the best of health, and lately he went to Atlantic City to recuperate. He returned apparently little benefited, and gradually he has been growing worse. The malady took on such a critical turn that his wife, who is in Muskoka, was sent for. Other relatives have been summoned to his bedside. Dr. McNichol, the attending physician, says that Mr. Carscalen may linger for weeks.

SHEDS HIS SKIN.
Mine Superintendent Exhibits a Peculiar Freak.
Phillipsburg, Mont., Aug. 14.—John H. Price, superintendent of the Gold Reef mine, has just finished shedding his skin. It is a peculiar piece of nature's work, the cause of which the medical profession has so far been unable to explain.
Some years ago, and lately, he went to Chicago, where eminent physicians from all over the world were in session, but no solution of the cause of the phenomena was obtained.
The shedding of the skin of Mr. Price's entire body is complete, including the nails on his fingers and toes. The process lasts from three to five days.

Nothing To Live For.
Tulso, Ok., Aug. 14.—Charles B. Funston, general agent of the North American Mutual Life Insurance company, of Mansfield, O., committed suicide in a hotel here yesterday afternoon. He left this note: "Father dead, mother dead, wife dead no children, no home, no money, no use living. Please notify my sister, Nettie Funston, Columbus, Ohio." Funston is supposed to be a relative of Gen. Fred. Funston. He was about fifty years of age, and had been connected with the Mansfield company for about ten years.
The body was removed from the hotel after dark, and the suicide hushed up. Funston drank carbolic acid, and he was terribly burned by the drug. His dead body was found by a bellboy, who climbed over the transom into the room.

ARE TO MUTINY
Bad News Received From Caucasus.
A GENERAL RISING
PUTS FEAR INTO RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT.

Deep Laid Plot to Assassinate Grand Duke—Guards at Rifle Practice Used Ball Cartridges Instead of Blanks—Arrests Made.
St. Petersburg, Aug. 14.—It is learned in connection with the attempt on Friday to assassinate Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholasewitch, while the grand duke was watching the rifle practice of the Imperial Guards, at Krasnoyarsko, a number of the guards, who were supposed to have been using blank cartridges, had been supplied with ball cartridges. The affair was a deep-laid plot, in which many civilians were implicated. A number of the plotters have been arrested. It is charged that these prisoners secured the connivance of responsible officers in the use of ball cartridges, so that the grand duke might be killed, and no one is able to say who had fired the fatal shot. The newspapers are not allowed to print anything about the affair.

The government has received bad news from the Caucasus, which is preparing for a general rising. The correspondents of St. Petersburg papers now in the Caucasus, have been arrested and their telegrams stopped. It is known, however, that the generals at Michaelovskai and Kars are preparing to mutiny.

Extremely Insecure.
London, Aug. 14.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says Premier Stolpin's position is extremely insecure. There is a great deal of ground for rumors that Mr. Stolypin's interest is being taken chiefly, who is in high favor at the court. The former is energetic and proved reactionary.

All Ready for Wedding, Father Disapproves.
New York, Aug. 14.—Through the ravings of a young woman who was picked up by the police in a dazed condition and sent to the Roosevelt hospital, the nurses last night learned that instead of being a victim of heat prostration, she was suffering from epileptic dementia, brought on by disappointed love.
The woman is Miss Julia Bergin. She was engaged to Charles McQuaid, and was to have been married at St. Michael's church last Sunday night. DESTROYED BY FIRE.
Sofia, Bulgaria, Aug. 14.—News from Anchaalos, where there was fighting on Sunday between Greeks and Bulgarians, states a great part of the town was destroyed by fire. The Greek metropolitan perished in the flames.
Pearl In Clam Shell.
Utica, N.Y., Aug. 14.—Eugene Smaltz went to a clamshell a couple of days ago, and found a rare pearl in a clam which he was about to devour. The gem is worth about \$1,000, and is a complete judge say. While he was opening the clam, Mr. Smaltz was surprised to see a small object roll at his feet. He picked it up and took the stone to a jeweler, who pronounced it a rare specimen. The pearl weighs four one-eighth carats, and is without a flaw.

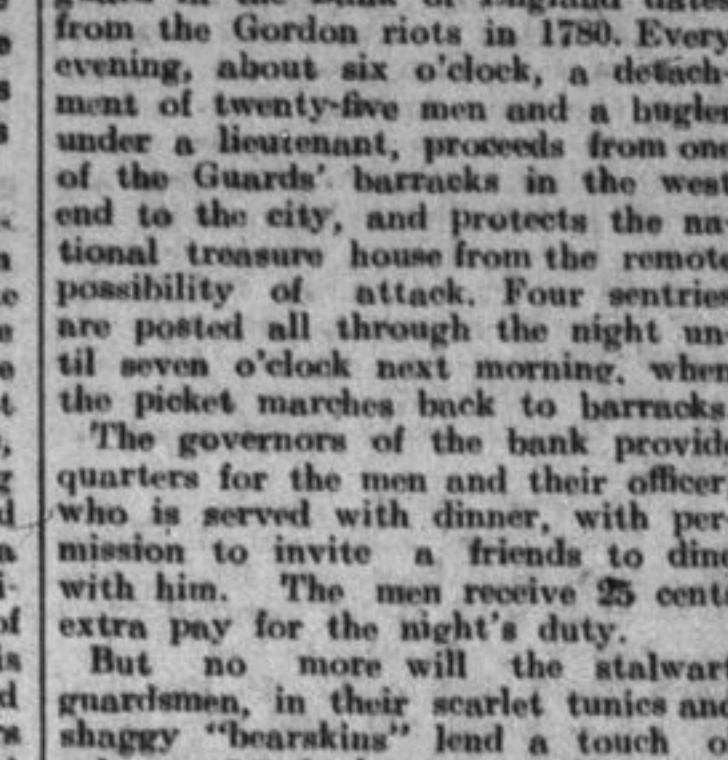
Died From Hydrophobia.
Morristown, Tenn., Aug. 14.—The Rev. James Brady, a Baptist clergyman, died last night, in the county jail of hydrophobia. He was bitten by his own dog. A few days later he developed symptoms of rabies, his jaws became locked, and was placed in a cell.

NO "GUARDS" FOR BANKS.
Picturesque London Life Will Be Missed.
London, Aug. 14.—Tourists will soon miss one of the daily picturesque incidents of London life—the march of the "bank pickets" of guardsmen to the Bank of England every evening. Owing to the reduced establishment of the Foot Guards, proposed by the liberal government, the duty of guarding the bank at night, will be taken over by a line regiment, and the only barracks in London ever occupied by line infantry being the tower, comparatively close to the bank, there will be no evening march of soldiery through the west end of the city, and the custom of mounting a military guard in the Bank of England dates from the Gordon riots in 1780. Every evening, about six o'clock, a detachment of twenty-five men and a higher under a lieutenant, proceeds from one of the Guards' barracks in the west end to the city, and protects the national treasury house from the remote possibility of attack. Four sentries are posted all through the night until seven o'clock next morning, when the picket marches back to barracks. The governors of the bank provide quarters for the men and their officer, who is served with dinner, with permission to invite a friend to dine with him. The men receive 25 cents extra pay for the night's duty. But no more will the stalwart guardsmen, in their scarlet tunics and shaggy "bearskins" lend a touch of color to London's gray streets as evening shadows fall.

TO RAISE STANDARD.
Of Protestant Education Throughout Quebec.
Huntingdon, Que., Aug. 14.—The educational campaign organized by Hon. Sydney Fisher, and committee including Messrs. Fisher, W. A. Weir, Prof. J. W. Robertson, Rev. W. E. Rexford, W. S. MacLaren, ex-M.P.P., Dr. R. S. Walsh, M.P., and the school commissioners of Huntingdon. The greatest interest is being taken throughout the district of Beaulieu, in the campaign, the general feeling being that the cause of elementary education has been greatly neglected in outlying districts in past years. The farmers are very sympathetic toward the movement for increasing the payment of teachers. The meeting this afternoon was enthusiastic and the keen interest and intelligent appreciation of the requirements of the situation displayed argues well for satisfactory results.

BLACK HAND DEMANDS.
Saloon Man Answers Threat With a Bullet.
Rochester, N.Y., Aug. 14.—A sensational shooting affair took place yesterday at the saloon of Frank Randazzo, No. 529 State street. According to the statement made to the police by Randazzo, three men entered the saloon while he was alone. One of them stepped up to the bar and demanded \$250 in cash at once, under penalty of death by the Black Hand. Randazzo said he opened the money drawer, but instead of taking out any money he secured his revolver and fired straight at the man who had made the demand. The man was killed instantly, the bullet taking effect in the heart. The other two men ran out of the place and escaped. It was found that the dead man was Lelajoyne D'Come, of this city. Randazzo was taken into custody.
