A Very Natty Eton.



Separate etons are very much in evidence this season, and the natty jacket pictured is one of a great variety of styles shown. It is built of tan cloth, with the becoming broad shoulder seams. A self-colored vest is inserted down the front and trimmed, as are the cuffs, with Richelieu pleatings of silk. A novel shaped military collar is attached, and button-trimmed. If the long coat sleeves are preferred, a pretty stitched cuff can be added with good effect. Where a more dressy effect than braided trimming is desired, Richelieu pleatings of silk or cloth can be applied. Dark mohair, silk or cloth skirts cut on the princess lines give a very graceful waistline to the figure when worn with one of these short etons, particularly when the coats are straight around the back and slightly pointed in the front. The back of this eton has but two seams, and the flatly stitched collar has the effect of a turnover. The full coat sleeves are still in the fore, and it is to be hoped will remain so, as they greatly enhance the beauty of a garment and do not crush the sleeves beneath. Buttons are being used to a great extent and on some coats two and three kinds will be worn, as they add much in dressing up an otherwise plain jacket.

Wage Workers Enter Politics.
 Boston, Mass., Aug. 14.—Delegates from Wage Earners' Clubs throughout the state met here to-day, in Dexter Hall, Wells memorial building, to consider plans for the part which the organizations are to take in the coming political campaign. Representatives from all the Central Labor Unions of the state, from all district organizations, and other centralized bodies, all in attendance, will confer with the committee of fifteen selected at the meeting of the Boston Wage Earners' Club, which started the movement in Faneuil Hall in the month of April of this year. The conference is of great importance and its decision will probably materially affect the outcome of the coming campaign. The report of all the state representatives and senators and also of all the members of congress and United States senators are before the conference and will be thoroughly analyzed.

Equivalent For Cordwood.
 Washington, D.C., Aug. 14.—Under the new army appropriation act, which went into effect on July 1st, the rate of \$3 a cord for standard fuel oil and gas under the allowance for fuel. They have been permitted for years to purchase certain kinds of fuel, particularly wood and coal, at the rate of \$3 a cord for standard oak wood. It was necessary to establish an equivalent rate for spruce, pine and different kinds of coal. The equivalent, in each case decided that 120 gallons of oil or 17,000 feet of wood may be regarded as a fair equivalent of one cord of standard oak wood.

Old-time Canadian Couple.
