WERE KNOWN HERE

FORMER KINGSTONIANS KILLED BY TRAINS.

Mr. O'Neil Was Run Down Near Buffalo—His Wife Lives Here—A Very Sad Message to Friends Here.

Word was received in the city, last night, from the coroner at North Tonawanda, N.Y., that Thomas Neil, Kingston, had been accidentally killed.

Beyond the fact that he met his death six miles this side of the town which is about half the distance between Niagara Falls and Buffalo, by being run over by the cars at the early hour of six o'clock, Wednesday morning, no particulars are received. O'Neil left here on the steamer North King, on Sunday evening, with the intention of going to Buffalo. Here he was to get a job on one of the upper lake boats.

He was a familiar character about the streets of Kingston, and had at different times sailed on many of the local schooners. He was aged about thirty-three years and a Roman Catholic in religion. He was married, and his widow, who survives him, resides in the city.

The body will be brought here for burial and will arrive Friday. The funeral will be private.
