WOODS' ARREST

HE WAS SECURED IN MONTREAL FOR THEFTS.

He Was a Leading Witness in the McKay Fur Robbery Trial—One of Cleverest of House Breakers.

When the news was received in the city, late Saturday, that John Woods, whose connection and star evidence in the John McKay fur robbery and trial has made him well-known about town, had been arrested, considerable interest was aroused.

John Woods, alias James R. Holtz, alias John Harrison, alias Edward Johnson, who is wanted to answer to charges of having broken into half a dozen private residences in the city during the past two weeks, is under arrest at police headquarters, and the detectives have recovered nearly all the silverware, clothing, furs, and other articles that he is accused of having stolen.

Woods was arrested on a street car at midnight, Thursday, by Detective Le Huquet, but it was not until yesterday that the stolen goods and other articles that he had disposed of at different places in the city were recovered.

Two weeks ago the residence of A. G. B. Claxton, 385 Guy street, was entered during the absence of the family, and \$300 worth of silverware taken from the house. The robbery was reported to Chief Detective Carpenter and Detective Sloan, and McLaughlin and Le Huquet were put to work on the case.

Woods had gone west when he left Kingston, and never suspected that he would return here to operate. He was surprised when he learned, a few days ago, that Woods was in the city. The chief then gave him instructions to pick him up and bring him to police headquarters, as he felt sure he was the man they wanted.

Thursday a report was received at detective headquarters that a man answering Woods' description had gone to Ottawa, that morning. Detective Viens was sent to the capital to search for him, but no trace of the man wanted could be found there.

Detective Le Huquet was walking along St. Catherine street on Thursday night, searching for Woods, when he noticed him passing on a street car. He jumped on the car, shook hands with Woods, and invited him to go to police headquarters. Woods at first declined to accept the invitation, but finally decided he would go with the detective.

When Chief Carpenter got hold of him, Woods admitted having committed the robberies at the Claxton, Crawford and Desharats residences, and also acknowledged breaking into the residence of Mayor Ekers, but in the latter place he was frightened away before he could get anything of value.

He told Chief Carpenter that he was stopping at the Place Viger hotel under the name of Johnson, and when the room he occupied there was searched a large amount of his plunder was discovered. He admitted here he had disposed of some of the stolen articles in the general property that he had been disposed of to reputable dealers, who Chief Carpenter said he thought were above buying goods from a man like Woods, as they must have been well aware that he did not possess them honestly.

Woods is considered to be one of the cleverest house-breakers in the country. He always dresses well and puts up at the best hotels. Usually he had a room in a private house near the hotel he is stopping at, so that when he leaves his hotel at night to do a job of house-breaking he goes to his room in the private house and changes his clothes. The last time he was arrested here he was stopping in the Queen's hotel, and had another room in a house in Imperial avenue. He was employed about a year ago as an orderly in the general property in jail that he became acquainted with Feldman, and after he was discharged he joined the Feldman gang of safe-breakers.

THE RIVER TRAFFIC

A NEW STEAMER PROPOSED FOR SERVICE.

Ogdensburg Men Interested in the Proposal—Plans Call For Steamer to Cost \$40,000.

A proposition is being advanced for the building of a fast river boat to run two round trips, daily between Ogdensburg and Alexandria Bay. The approximate cost of such a boat would be \$40,000.

With the arrest of Woods on new charges, the case for the defence in the action against Charles Schacher, to be heard in December, will be materially strengthened. Little reliance is now put to be put in for some detective as Woods. "I told you so" will be a familiar phrase used towards the case of Woods.

Just before he left for Montreal, Woods stated to a Whig reporter, "When I return to Montreal, I shall, of course, do my best to get a job, but I shall not be doing any detective work, to find Helmar and the furs. You may fully expect to see me at the next trial."

The only Kingstonian to read a paper will be Dr. E. Ryan, superintendent of Rockwood hospital. His subject will be "Application of Modern Methods For Treatment of the Insane." The doctor is also on the list to propose the toast to the visitors. He will be accompanied on his trip by Mrs. Ryan.

A VETERAN SOLDIER

Is Here on a Visit to His Brother.

Captain Thomas Mackenzie, of Fredericton, N.B., is visiting his brother, George Mackenzie, Brock street. His parents were old Kingstonians, and the visitor has been a soldier since 1841. He was present at Chatham, Eng., when Queen Victoria called the soldiers home in 1840. Mr. Mackenzie served in the 94th Regiment, of which his father was master tailor; he was through the Indian mutiny, serving at Lucknow, Cawnpore, etc., under Sir Henry Havelock, Lord Clyde and Sir Colin Campbell. He also went through the Persian campaign, just previous to the mutiny, and on his way home from Persia, in the city of Bombay, he got from one man-of-war steamer to another, and proceeded to Calcutta on the breaking out of the mutiny.

ROBBED A FIRM

N. C. POLSON'S CHEMIST WORKS ENTERED.

The Place Was Well Ransacked and Goods Carried Off—Nitric Acid Spoiled Big Order of Goods.

Between eleven o'clock Saturday night and seven o'clock Sunday morning burglars entered the premises, on Ontario street, occupied by the firm of N. C. Polson & Sons, manufacturing chemists. The thieves gained admittance through a window of the door at the rear of the building. The glass therein was broken but the opening had been securely boarded in. This covering was loosened and entrance thereby gained. It is surmised that youths went into the building through older heads may have been on the outside engineering the exploit. One fact is evident, however, and that is, the marauders were thoroughly acquainted with the interior of the place for they knew just where to go for the most desirable articles.

Both upstairs and down the stock was strewn about and a little taken from several orders which had been made up for delivery are missing and about a hundred yards of ribbon. A large bottle of nitric acid was spilled by the marauders and about \$40 worth of goods ready for shipment thereby destroyed. The office desks were also rifled, but nothing valuable secured. P.C. Arnel has charge of the case and hopes soon to have the guilty parties located.
