Beals Wright, the United States lawn tennis champion, was defeated by W. A. Larned in the Southampton lawn tennis contests, in the semifinal, 6-4, 10-8.
Patrick T. Powers, president of the Provision Club, and former Eastern League head, has expressed great indignation over the firing and suspension of his manager, Jack Dunn.
"Hurry Up" Yost, the great American football coach, will tour Canada to study Canadian rugby, the new American rule making, the game across the border resembles the Canadian article in some features.

GREAT DISSATISFACTION.

Orangemen Reading Their Political Allies a Lesson.
At the Derry celebration in Arran, Crawford Ross, of Ottawa, said many people seemed to think that the usefulness of the Orange order was a thing of the past. In Canada there was not wanting evidence that the work was only beginning. Ten years ago at the bidding of the hierarchy the government in power introduced remedial legislation and sought to place separate schools in Manitoba. The Orangemen had assisted in putting that government out of power, but it seemed that they had cut off their noses to spite their faces. The present government, a session or two ago, passed an autonomy measure, fixing on the province of Alberta and Saskatchewan for all time to come separate schools. He hoped that when the proper time came, Orangemen and Orange Young Britons would not be more merciful to the government than they had been to their friends. The government at Toronto was trucking to the Irish Catholic vote, to which Mr. Whitney owed nothing. The Toronto house was full of Irish Catholic officials, and if one dropped out he was replaced by another Roman Catholic. The government should not try any more ploys. If they made another appointment like Dr. Ryan's, they would find that the Orangemen were a force to be reckoned with. Some friends of the government seemed to think that the Orange association did not amount to much, but if the government didn't mend their ways they would find the Orange association a force, and would have judgment mended out to them.

RETURNED SAFELY.

The Domestic Not Irrevocably Lost.
Gananoque Reporter.
Mr. Nelson, of Philadelphia, Pa., who had Cherry Island rented, applying to the mayor last Wednesday evening for assistance in a search for a woman domestic, who disappeared unaccountably from the island, and who it was feared was drowned. Constable Thomson was detailed to take the matter in hand, and he engaged some men to drag the river near Cherry Island. But the evening was so far advanced before they were ready, action was deferred till next morning. Late at night the constable learned that a woman answering the description given had come down from Howe Island, with Dr. Irving. He saw Mr. and Mrs. Nelson at the railway station, where they were anxiously waiting for morning, and told them what he had heard. They said that the woman had not returned to the island, and it was she who came with the doctor, she must have returned to town. Constable Thomson then started to enquire at the hotels, and at the first place he stopped, the American Hotel, he was informed that the woman had come there a short time before, and had retired for the night. It is explained that while she was alone on the island, she took a notion to go to Kingston, and was taken to the foot of Howe Island by someone passing whom she hailed. She expected to get a steamer there, but was disappointed. Dr. Irving had been up on Howe Island with a horse and buggy, and as he came back to take the ferry John Gillespie informed him of the woman's presence, and asked him to bring her to Gananoque. The doctor consented, and she came with him to town, getting out of the buggy at the International Hotel corner. She went back to Cherry Island Thursday morning.
