PICKED UP A SKIFF

Evidence of a Tragedy in Lake Ontario.

Bowmanville, Aug. 22.—As the R. & O. Navigation company's steamer Picton was coming down the lake from Toronto last evening when nearly opposite Frenchman's Bay the captain discovered a small craft adrift on the water. He stopped the steamer and had the launch pulled on board. It was found to be a skiff in good condition, made by O. L. Hicks, Humber Bay, and in the bottom was found a man's pair of tweed trousers of dark grey color, fairly well worn, and a black shirt. In a pocket of the trousers were a silver watch, made by the Connecticut Watch company, attached to a white metal fob, and fifteen cents in silver. In another pocket was a Grand Trunk railway's conductor's check, on which was the No. 113. There were also a dark grey Mikado hat in the skiff, a pair of boxenl boots and a pair of oars. These facts indicate that there has in all likelihood been a suicide or a case of accidental drowning. These particulars were given to Harbourmaster John McMillan at Port Bowmanville. The pursuer took the articles in charge and has carried them on to Montreal.

Suicide With Two Poisons

Hannon, N.Y., Aug. 22.—Mrs. Julia Carlan of Watertown, committed suicide, yesterday, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. C. Tull, of this place, by taking carbolic acid and laudanum. She was about seventy years of age. She left Watertown Monday forenoon to visit Mrs. Tull.

He is now at the hospital and the doctors say is doing as well as can be expected.
